Of late years he has made his home with his son, Joseph at Lyons but when the family were all taken down with scarlet fever he was moved to Samuel Garton's. His wife predeceased him in 1913. He is survived by seven sons and five daugh-ters, all of whom reside in East Eigin, with the exception of John, in Southampton, England and Fred of Prince Rupert, C. The funeral will take place from the residence of his son, Samuel, Yarmouth, to-day at 12 o'clock noon, and after service at the house, interment will take place at Dorchester Station.
