**Grand Lodge A. F. and A. M.**

Ross Robertson, has decided, in conse-  
quence of limited accommodation in To-  
ronto during the third week in July, to  
cause by the international convention of

meeting will be held in Toronto on Wednes-  
day, July 15, when an adjournment will be  
made to call the following Wednesday, July  
22.

**Protests Entered.**

the election of Mr. Charles S. Hyman, M.P.,  
for this city, and it is probable that the  
document will be entered to-day.

**Very sudden Death.**  
Mrs. America Bartlett, living next door  
to Knox Church, on Wortley road, South  
London, died very suddenly and unex-  
pectedly early Saturday morning. She had  
enjoyed splendid health previously, a fact  
which made her sudden demise a particu-  
larly sad event. At 10:30 o'clock she was

this morning. Deceased came to London  
from England about one year ago, and in

friends. She was 55 years of age and a  
consistent member of the Church of Eng-  
land. She leaves four sons and four daugh-  
ters, her husband being still in the old  
country. The funeral will take place on  
Monday afternoon.
