SEVENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS. Board of Education Estimates for the Current Year-\$40,000 for Salaries— Teachers' Salaries Discussed— Some Changes Made.

At a meeting of No. 1 Committee of the Board of Education Wednesday night the consideration of the estimates for the current year was taken up, the Council having urgently requested the same. It was decided that over \$40,000 would be required for salaries, and nearly \$70,000 for all school purposes. The latter amount will he asked for.

The report of the special committee on the revision of teachers' salaries where their stipends have been changed without authority was read. Miss McDonald was allowed to retain her \$31 50 increase. No action was taken in the cases of Misses Pitcher, Robertson and Pairburn. The committee will recommend that from January next kindergarten teachers receive advances on the same basis as second-class professionals, Miss McKenzle to receive a special increase of \$25 at the beginning of the year. In wards five and six the teachers will be placed as nearly as possible on an equal footing with those of the other wards; in ward six increases of \$12 50 from last January will be granted. No increase will be given Misses Johnston, Evans, Macklin and Hall.
