THE LICENSES. Th following copy of a resolution ad- manded until Monday. opted by the Talbot Street Baptist Church at its annual meeting on May 14, 1895, has been handed in with a request for publication:
"Whereas the license commissioners

of this city have extended the time for the sale of intoxicating liquors from the hour of 10 p.m. to 11 p.m., which according to the confession of the rumsellers, is the time when they do their largest trade and consequently work the greatest amount of evil to society; and, whereas, such action is contrary to the wishes of a large majority of our fellow-citizens; and, whereas, we believe said action to have been dictated by motives unworthy the character and dignity of men charged with such grave responsibilites, and as such tending to seriously impair the usefulness of the commission and the respect and confidence in which it should be held by the public; therefore, be it resolved, that we, the members of the Talbot Street Baptist Church, in our annual meeting assembled, recognize in the liquor traffic the foe of the civilization we admire and the religion we serve, the corrupter of public and private morals, the enemy of the home, the destroyer of youth, the prolific source of poverty, disease, misery and crime, deem ourselves compelled to express our surprise, alarm, and indignation at the course pursued by the license com-missioners, and our condemnation of their action as inimical to the general good. may be modified by aid from the Home Government. If not, Canada can only supplement the proposal made to your delegate by agreeing, in additon to aid in the construction of the foundland railway from River Exploits to Port Aux Barques by a subsidy of \$6,000 per mile, and to add \$35,000 additional to yearly allowance.'

The Government have withheld all open papers relating to the proposition to Britain, and its conduct is severely condemned by many members. also remarked that nothing is said on the subject of the French Government's claim to a large portion of the shores of Newfoundland.

BREAKING BYLAWS.

A Number of Men and Boys Before the Police Magistrate-Maggie Green Discharged.

Violation of the city's bylaws caused the appearance in the Police Court this morning of nine men and boys. George Ballantine, Henry Brennan and Frank Brown, three newsboys, formerly connected with Mr. Grigg's home on Richmond street, were charged with shooting firecrackers into a rear window of the building. Ballantine was chief spokesman for the party, and denied guilt on behalf of himself and Brown. Brennan went into the box and admitted having committed the offense, but refuted what Sergt. Crawford had said -that his (Brennan's) pals were throwing the firecrackers too. Brennan was allowed to go on suspended sentence, and Ballantine and Brown were discharged.

Henry McCurdy and Percy Blackwell, two York street boys, were also charged with exploding firecrackers on the highway. They were allowed to go. "I cannot put up with the nuisance any longer," said the police magistrate, when the cases were disposed of. "I will have to impose fines in future."

Ham Taylor was fined \$2 for allowing eight cattle to run at large. "And how many did you have at large?" asked the police magistrate of John Hennessy, of Queen's avenue, when his name was called. "Well, you see," Mr. Hennessy went on to explain, "my cow got on to the
