Says Graydon's Trip to Detroit Was a Corrupt One,

And That Richardson Was an Agent and Broke the Law.

Tell Tale Error in a Conservative Voters' List.

Why Did Toothe, Sharkey & Co. Rush to Detroit?

And Graydon Spend Two Days Looking for Lockington?

Toothe and Graydon Excoriated for Tampering with Witnesses.

Claims That the Election Was a Pure One.

And Asks that Graydon's Evidence Be Credited Against All the Others -Judge Robertson and Judge Ferguson Differ On Points.

The last guns are being discharged in the great election battle at the court house. They are big guns, too Christopher Robinson, Q.C., fired his volley for the defense on Saturday night, Speaking from 8:15 to 11:30 o'clock without cessation. The judges sat at night especially for his accommodation, as he had to catch the early train for Toronto yesterday, to make connections for Europe. Mr. Osler kindly consented to have his argument broken to oblige Mr. Robinson, and this morning the great counsel for the petitioner resumed his masterly review of the evidence, clinching argument after argument with statutory authori-

Saturday Afternoon.

When the judges took their seats at 2 p.m., Mr. Osler resumed his address, delivered in his clear-cut, incisive, deliberate style. He launched into the Detroit group of charges, and first took up the case of Thomas Lloyd, a railway man. Lloyd had seen Graydon, and Graydon had solicited his vote. Lloyd said he could not pay his fare to London, and Graydon said Richardson would attend to him. Richardson afterwards "loaned" Lloyd \$1 50, and presented him with a railway ticket. Lloyd had not repaid the said Lloyd was friendly to the other side. He was a respectable man, whose evidence could not be assailed. How was his evidence met? Mr. Osler then read from Richardson's evidence at Detroit, in which Richardson admitted he had "loaned" \$1 50 and a railway ticket to London. Richardson had not been repaid the money, nor had he asked for it. Richardson could not remember that Graydon had told him to attend to Lloyd, as Lloyd had sworn. Mr. Osler pointed out that Richardson had started off by deny

ing he ever gave anything to Lloyd, SUBSEQUENTLY CONFESSED to the ticket and \$1 50. "Now," said Mr. Osler, "is that a transaction with-

in the act, apart from the question of Judge Robertson-Suppose Richard-Mr. Osler said he would argue that Richardson was an agent. Mr. Osler then cited sub-section "a" of section 84 and section 88. According to subsection "a." any person who loaned. or agreed to give or loan any money or consideration to any voter to induce him to vote, was guilty of a corrupt practice; also by section 88, the same rule applied to railway tickets. Osler read a decision by Judge Street in East Elgin. Judge Street ruled that was a corrupt act for a candidate or agent to loan money to a voter if voter said he would not vote unless he received the loan.

JUDGES VS. JUDGE. Justice Robertson said it was duty of every man to vote, and Lloyd wanted to vote. Was Richardson's loan intended to "enable" Lloyd to vote, or to "induce" him to vote? Justice Ferguson-I don't agree with the general proposition of Mr. Justice Robertson, that a man should vote, if he did not want either of the can-

IT WAS NOT A LOAN. Mr. Osler quoted from Richardson's evidence to show that Lloyd never asked for a loan. It was proposed by

Richardson. Lloyd was a stranger to Richardson. Richardson took no due bill and never asked for a return of the money. Richardson kept no ac-count of the loan to Lloyd. Lloyd said he did not have the money to enable him to go to London to vote, and Richardson offered to loan him the means. Mr. Osler submitted that the only question now left was the question as to Harold Richardson's agency. Mr. Osler then started to argue agency on Richardson's part.

AT A PRAYER MEETING. Graveon had sent Richardson into the meeting to get Lloyd. Richardson had therefore assisted Graydon in his work of canvassing and working for Beautie, This was a direct act of agency on Richardson's part. Mr. Osler read from Graydon's evidence to show that Graydon had written to Toothe, saying that Richardson would attend to certain Detroit voters. Here was another proof of Richardson's agency. Toothe telegraphs to Harold Richardson, "Send Harvey down at once." Here was another item of It was a telegram paid for by Mr. Beattie, the candidate. When Graydon was asked to explain this telegram he said that he had men-tioned Richardson to Toothe in connection with Lloyd's vote. Toothe was asked to produce that letter, but did not have it. Was it not proof that

such was the case that Toothe had DESTROYED THE LETTER? Business men, who had nothing to conceal, did not destroy letters. Politicians who had something to conceal did destroy them. Mr. Osler further pointed out that don on the night previous to the election. Then they had the evidence of Ryckman and Fitzhenry, Graydon, Richardson and others as to the association of Graydon and Richardson on that trip. The two were working in a common cause, as shown by telegram from Graydon to Richardson on election night, "Shake, my boy!" Add to this the whole position and object of the Graydon trip. "Graydon went to Detroit to see laboring men who could not afford to go to London to vote, and we are asked to believe that he went up there mere-

ly to see these voters. I am going to ask your lordships to believe that that WAS A CORRUPT TRIP. from the beginning. However unpleasant it is to contradict Graydon, he is contradicted by the weight of his own acts in the Norfolk election." Mr. Osler argued that the Lloyd case proved a corrupt act within the law's

Judge Robertson asked if an agent of the condidate could appoint another agent, and the candidate be responsible night. That was the last seen of the condidate be responsible night. Carty received a ticket and money in an envelope to come to London and vote for Beattie. E. J. Carty swore N. P. Graydon gave him the money and tickets by the hand of John S. Carty. Graydon was not in the court when E. J. Carty gave his evidence, but when Graydon returned to the court from his unsuccessful search for Lockington in Detroit, he was identified by John S. Carty, to the best of Carty's knowledge. This ticket and money was given during Graydon's visit to Windsor and Detroit. The envelope bore the Crawford House im-

Mills were not impeachable witnesses. GRAYDON'S POSITION UNENVI-"I approach Mr. Graydon's evidence with great regret as a professional man, but I have to do it. "In a delicate class of cases it is laid down by some that it is more dishonorable for a man to tell the truth where the truth brings disgrace on another party whom he has com-promised. At any rate, it is club ethics to be the duty of a man to swear the matter through. Is this not a fair inference of Mr. Graydon's conduct? He confesses his ability to break the law. He has done it in an election. in which he is not interested; but he asks you to believe that although he did it in Norfolk, he would not do it in London! It is too much to ask.' THE TELL-TALE TELEGRAMS. Mr. Osler then read the tell-tale
