ORIGIN OF UNIVERSITIES.

An Interesting Lecture by Prof. Rigby - Mayor Little Presides.

Mayor Little presided last night at the fourth of the Western University lectures given in the Auditorium. The lecturer was Rev. Prof. Rigby, M.A., of Trinity University, Toronto, and his subject was "The Early History of Cambridge University." The audience was not as large as the speaker and his address merited. The latter was an exceedingly instructive and entertaining historical sketch, not only of Cambridge, but of antecedent universities on the continent of Europe. The most ancient university of Europe was one for instruction in medicine, and it was attended by women as well as men. In the seventh century, the University of Bologna was established, in which civil (and afterwards canon) law was taught. Next was established the University of Paris, for training in arts and theology, and the degree for a master's license to teach was granted there by the chancellor of the cathedral. With the degree and membership in the society of the masters, the holder was in a position to teach. Afterwards the university became independent of the chancellor of the cathedral.

Oxford University was established through a migration from Paris in 1157. The King of France issued an order in that year, expelling alien scholars, and about the same time the King of England recalled clerks studying at Paris, but who had benefited at home. Shortly afterwards, the studium generale was established at Oxford. Cambridge was established by a migration from Oxford, under the following circumstances. In 1209 a student of Oxford accidentally killed a person, and King John, who was not very friendly to the ecclesiastics, gave orders to execute the clerks. Two or three were put to death, and as a protest against this action, the masters and students, to the number of 160, left the university and migrated to Paris, and others migrated to Cambridge, and established the university there. In the thirteenth century, in the English universities were largely augmented through another migration from Paris, owing to a riot between students and citizens. Henry III., learning of the occurrence, cordially invited them to come to England.

The professor also dwelt on the origin, growth and work of noted English colleges. He was tendered a hearty vote of thanks on the motion of Mayor Little, who referred to the advantages London derives from an institution as the Western University.
