Felt Washers That Protect

In ordinary types of bearings, the felt washers for "dust protection" (?) are between moving parts, and actually catch more grit and grind it into the bearing than would get into "unprotected" bearings.

In the E. & D. the only entrance for dust is at the axle of four-point bearings. The felt washer does not move. It is protected by a shield on the outside. Inside there is another shield against the washer. To reach the bearings the dust has to pass diagonally through 1/4 inch of felt. It cannot.
