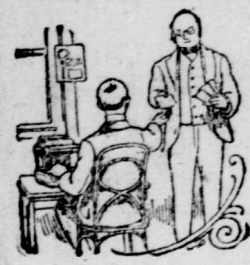

METEOROLOGICAL

Toronto, Ont., June 18.—The weather continues very warm in Manitoba. Thunderstorms have occurred in the western part of the province, but have not yet extended as far east as Winnipeg. From Lake Superior eastward to the Maritime Provinces it continues fine and moderately warm, and present indications point to clear skies and higher temperature. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 64-64; Kamloops, 56-72; Calgary, 44-74; Prince Albert, 52-74; Qu'Appelle, 58-68; Winnipeg, 64-85; Port Arthur, 44-68; Parry Sound, 50-76; Toronto, 64-74; Ottawa, 50-74; Montreal, 50-72; Quebec, 43-76; Halifax, 50-64.

Local temperature.—The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Monday, June 18, were 71.5 and 47.

Today (Tuesday) the sun rose at 4:35 a.m., and sets at 8:02 p.m. The moon rises at midnight and sets at 12:04 a.m.

MEMBERS OF THE SYNOD MEET.

Last night a meeting of the members of the synod was held in Huron College. An address was given by Rev. Rural Dean Deacon, of Stratford, who presided, and introduced the following programme: Address, "Sources of the Liturgy," Rev. Rural Dean Craig, Petrolia; discussion on same, led by Revs. A. P. Moore, Listowel, and R. J. Murphy, Essex; address, "Church Education of the Young," Rev. Canon Dann; discussion by Revs. W. H. Baines, Walkerville, and W. J. Taylor, St. Marys. This morning at 8 o'clock the clergymen met at the Palace Cafe, Welland. Breakfast was served. Rev. E. J. Anderson, of Kingsville, presided at a meeting that was held there immediately afterwards. An address on the subject of "The Clergyman and the Bible," was delivered by Rev. David Williams, of Stratford. A discussion followed that was open to all the clergy, and was led by Rev. Canon Hincks, Windsor; Rev. Wm. Henderson, Watford; and Rev. Dr. Bethune, London.

PUBLIC MAY USE IT

Water Commissioners Say Springbank Pavilion Must Not Be Closed Except When It Is Used for Parties—Over Twelve Feet of Water in the Reservoir.

The board of water commissioners met at the city hall yesterday afternoon and discussed the complaints made about the upper story of the Springbank pavilion being closed to the public. Lessee Walter Bradford has an agreement with Dayton & McCormick, whereby they have the exclusive use of the second floor for dancing. The upper story of the pavilion must be open to the public, except when being used for private parties. If the lessee fails to comply with the wishes of the board, legal measures will be taken. Joseph Sproule applied for a water main on Wellington street north, and Ald. Barned for a service on Forward avenue, West London, for a lot just outside the city limits. Engineer Moore will report on both applications.

The board was notified by the deputy commissioner of the Ontario fishery department that the fish traps in the new Springbank dam were satisfactory.

The C. P. R. having applied for remission of rates on a house at 184 Ann street, the board declined to allow any remission.

A main will be laid on Partridge street, between William and Maitland streets, to cost \$400.

Engineer Findlay's report for the fortnight showed that the amount of water pumped had been 37,446,240 gallons, with the engines working from fifteen to eighteen hours per day. There was never less than twelve feet of water in the reservoir during the two weeks.

PROPOSED NEW BELT LINE

Changes in the Route Are Suggested.

Matter Goes Back to Committee—Union Label Question Revived—A Block of Tar-Macadam To Be Laid.

Last night the aldermen enjoyed the unusual experience of leaving the city hall at 9:15 o'clock. This happy result was largely due to the absence of the oratorical efforts in which one or two members love to indulge. The committee reports contained little that was of more than passing importance, and few recommendations were objected to. The proposed South street belt line matter was not considered, but will be brought up after having been investigated by committee.

City Solicitor Meredith communicated his opinion that the proposed grant of \$100 for the entertainment of the delegates to the Metal Polishers' convention was illegal, if that amount was not provided for in the estimates. Filed for reference.

The proposed change in the street car service and the establishment of a new belt line along South street was referred back to committee with power. The line suggested by the company was not totally favored by the aldermen. The company proposes to extend the line east on South street to Adelaide street, south to Nightingale avenue, east to Rectory street, north to Grey street, west on Grey street to the Hamilton road and thence to the city. Another suggestion is to extend the line along South street to Adelaide street, north to Layard street, east to Maitland street, north to Hill street, east to Rectory street, north to Grey street, and west on Grey to the Hamilton road. A third suggestion takes in the Hamilton road as far as Egerton street and return.

The matter of the contract for the firemen's clothing was reopened by the recommendation of No. 3 committee to give the contract to Mr. M. W. Slater, the price to be \$23.50 per suit.

Ald. Jolly desired to eliminate altogether the union label clause from the specifications. His amendment embodied this desire, and proposed also that new tenders be called for, after Mr. Boyd's refusal to carry out his contract had been obtained.

This was lost, and Ald. Stevenson's further amendment that this refusal be first obtained and that the contract be then awarded to Mr. Slater, carried.

The following cement walks will be advertised: Both sides of Prospect avenue; Hamilton road, between Maitland and Redan streets; north side of Maple street, between Talbot and Ridout streets; north side of Horton street, between Wellington and Clarence; west side of Ontario street, between Queen's avenue and Lorne avenue.

No. 3 committee reaffirmed its former recommendation re sale of spaces on the Market Square for the sale of fruit. These spaces are on the west side of the produce shed. Objection was made that it would leave no place for marketing grocers' wagons. An amendment to the effect that no spaces be sold was lost, as also was the original motion, thus leaving the committee with no power to sell spaces.

The recommendation in No. 2 committee's report, re award of contracts for painting city bridges, was referred back with power, in order that two

coats instead of three be tendered for. Ald. Plant asked the mayor's ruling in regard to No. 1 committee's recommendation that the usual grant of \$23 be made to the School Teachers' Association. This request was doubtless suggested by the city solicitor's opinion grant to the Metal Polishers' Union, as this grant is provided for by statute.

Mayor Rumball ruled that the grant could be made, and the matter was referred back with power.

The hospital building committee recommended that Architect McBride be paid \$476.07, in full for his services supervising the construction of Victoria Hospital. Referred back with power, together with Mr. McBride's account of \$658.

In reply to a query by Ald. Plant, it was stated that the opinion of the city solicitor was that no rates could be charged for the sewer on Horton street between Richmond and Talbot streets, as it was private property originally. A new electric light will be placed at the corner of Nelson and Rectory streets. In connection with this recommendation Mayor Rumball suggested that No. 3 committee should curtail their expenses in order to lessen an overdraft that the other committees would probably have.

A tar-macadam pavement will be laid on Queen's avenue, between Maitland and Adelaide streets.

No. 1 committee again reported progress in the consideration of the school board's estimates.

A bylaw to borrow \$50,000 to cover current expenditure was passed.
