ATTACKS THE KING

London Church Times Says He Should Know Better Than
Follow His Mother's Example.

London, Oct. 16.—The Church Times,
organ of the Ritualists, contains a
virulent attack on King Edward for
attending the services of the Cralthe
Presbyterian Parish Church. The
King, declares this newspaper, is a
"catholic prince," and as such ought
not to be found worshipping in the
ample.

EARL RUSSELL LEAVES PRISON

Having Served Three Months for the Crime of Bigamy—
Will Start for Nevada—Bread Riots in Russia—
Miss Stone Still a Prisoner.

London, Oct. 17.—Earl Russell, who
in July was sentenced by a court of the
House of Lords to three months' im-
prisonment for bigamy, was released from
Holloway jail early this morning. Earl
Russell is in good health.

The application of Countess Russell
to make absolute her decree of divorce
will be heard Oct. 28. In the event of
the application being granted, it is an-
nounced, the earl and Mrs. Somerville
will be married a few days later. As
soon as the earl has arranged a few pri-
vate business matters he and his sec-
ond wife will leave for Nevada, where
the earl obtained a divorce from his
first wife. It is said the earl will drop
the title and apply for American citi-
zenship. He will probably settle on a
ranch in Nevada and dispose of all his
English holdings which are not entail-
ed. The earl's first wife is now playing
in provincial music halls in England,
and has never expressed regret for her
prosecution of her former husband.

BATTALING BREAD RIOTS.
London, Oct. 17.—The Lemberg pa-
pers report bread riots at Taraskova,
Eastern Russia, says the Vienna cor-
respondent of the Daily Mail. "In
Samara the starving peasants storm-
ed the municipal buildings and the
residences of wealthy persons, setting
some on fire. Troops were summoned,
and fourteen peasants were killed."
Similar riots in which several per-
sons were killed, occurred at Ander-
weska, where two land owners had

been murdered, and also at Pesetwira
and elsewhere in the same district."

The Vienna News Abend Blatt re-
ports that there has been rioting in
Kichenef, Dessarabia, where 1,000 stu-
dents attacked and wrecked the house
of the governor, the headquarters of
the police and the office of the official
Gazette. Many encounters took place
between the students and the police
and 11 persons were killed and 56 in-
jured.

NOTORIOUS BRIGAND CAPTURED.
Rome, Oct. 17.—The notorious brig-
and, Mussolino, has been captured,
after a fierce resistance, at Urbino.
He had long terrorized Calabria and
is credited with having committed 25
murders. Owing to the sympathy
shown him by the peasantry, he had
always escaped capture, despite the
immense reward the government of-
fered for his arrest. His career as an
outlaw began two years ago, when he
was liberated from what he considered
an unjust imprisonment. He vowed
to kill the fifteen witnesses who were
responsible for his conviction, and he is
said to have actually dispatched twelve
of them.

MISS STONE STILL A CAPTIVE.
Constantinople, Oct. 17.—As no news
has been received here from Messrs.
Havell and Hasell, the missionaries,
who have been attempting to get into
touch with the two brigands, who ab-
ducted Miss Ellen M. Stone, a third
missionary has been dispatched in
quest of them and the brigands.

The headquarters of Miss Stone's
captors is a thickly wooded mountain-
top near the border line of Turkey
and Bulgaria. Miss Stone has only
light summer clothing. The brigands
refuse to allow her to keep her bag-
gage, but let her have a Bible. The
leader of the band is the notorious
Bocho, from the Bulgarian town of
Dubica.

MADE A MEAL OF MARINES.
Advices received from Rio Muni, a
Spanish possession on the west coast
of Africa, say that some cannibals who
recently captured seven Spanish mar-
ines have eaten the prisoners.

RECESSION OF MANCHURIA.
Twice within a week Li Hung Chang
has visited M. Pauli Lessor, Russian
minister to China at Peking. Chinese
officials assert that Earl Li has pre-
sented for the recession of Manchuria, M.
Lessor has agreed to send a special
envoy to St. Petersburg to
arrange terms, and Earl Li suggest-
ing for the mission his greatest enemy,
Chang Chih Tung. The story must be
accepted with some reserve.

The same powerful opposition that
was employed before is again en-
deavouring to prevent the signature of the
convention, but Russia's promise to re-
store the railway from Shan Hai
pass to Peking is a powerful
lever in the hands of M. Lessor.

THE ALDERSHOT FIGHT.
In the absence of further advices
from England, it is altogether likely
that the feud arose, as so many of
these regimental feuds do, out of a
little private squabble. Soldiers from
different regiments meet in drinking
places, where they are under no mili-
tary control, a sneering remark is

made about one of the regiments, and
all the soldiers of that regiment be-
lieve they are in honor bound to wipe
out the affront. Next minute there is
a free fight in progress, the soldiers
generally using their belts and strik-
ing with the buckles. If they are not
interfered with, they generally settle
the dispute then and there, with a lit-
tle blood-letting, otherwise the insult
is remembered, it may be for years,
and sometimes the feud is fought out
by men who were not in the service
when the original quarrel took place.
There have been many such encoun-
ters in the British army, but few of
them have gone to such lengths. The
historian of the behavior of the main
engaged do not make any reference to
this feud, so it is probably a very re-
cent one.

NOT FIT TO PRINT.
When the hearing of the charges
against Theodore and Laura Jackson
(Ann O'Della Diss Debar) was resumed
in the police court Wednesday, the
woman entered the dock dressed in
spotted white. She placed her hands
together before her face and ignor-
ing her eyes in the attitude of prayer.
The crowded court room was silent.
The hearing of the behavior of the main
defendant toward a young woman who
was one of the victims of the pair.
The alleged deceptions were seem-
ingly accompanied by hypnotic influence.
As the prisoners left the dock they
were hissed by the spectators. Jack-
son cried, "Keep quiet, you reptiles."
The testimony of the woman, which
usually print verbatim reports of sen-
sational criminal trials, say that in
this instance they are unable to do so.
CANADA CATTLE IN ENGLAND.

At a meeting of the Aberdeen har-
bor commissioners, Mayor Lyon sug-
gested that the committee should be
continued to watch over the Canadian
cattle question, and also stated that
the commissioners should make ap-
plication for a license being granted for
the landing and slaughtering of fat
cattle.

CABLE NOTES.
Li Hung Chang is urging Russia to
give up Manchuria.

Baroness Burdett-Coutts is probably
fatally ill near London, England.

Five of the crew of the American
training ship Buffalo have deserted in
Kiel, Germany.

A Christiania cable says: The in-
creased duties on raw and manu-
factured tobacco agreed upon by the
