METEOROLOGICAL
Toronto, March 2, 3 p.m.—Another important disturbance now centered near Montreal has traveled with great rapidity from the region of the Gulf of Mexico. Fresh to heavy gales prevail in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces, attended by heavy rains, and Quebec city reports a thunderstorm. The advance of the western cold weather has been retarded under existing conditions, but in Ontario it is now turning colder, with snow.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 16-38; Qu'Appelle, 4-24; Winnipeg, 8 below-18; Port Arthur, zero-24; Parry Sound, 9-35; Toronto, 34-40; Ottawa, 32-40; Montreal, 34-38; Quebec, 32-42; Halifax, 36-48.

QUARTER RECORD AT POLICE COURT.
Convictions Numbered 104 and 431 Was Paid in Fines.

The police court statistics for the quarter ending Feb. 28 show a total of 104 summary convictions, with \$431 paid in fines, and thirteen commitments in default of payments. Breaches of by-law head the list of offenses with 48, while there were 30 cases of drunk, disorderly and vagrant persons. Other offenses were breach of liquor license act, 1; assault, 2; stealing fowls, 1; bartering on Sunday, 2; keeping disorderly house, 1; frequenting a disorderly house, 1; carrying firearms, 1; and breach of pharmacy act, 1.
