ENDS RULE OF SWORD A PRIEST-HERO

U. S. Troops Recalled From Cripple Creek District.

Denver, Col., July 28.—Governor Peabody today issued a proclamation calling off military rule and placing the Cripple Creek district in charge of the civil authorities.

This action was taken by the governor in the face of opposition from many influential citizens of Cripple Creek, who desire to prevent deported union miners from returning to the district. Before issuing his order, however, the governor received assurances from Sheriff Edward Bell that his forces were able to control the situation.

Military rule was proclaimed in Teller County on June 8 in consequence of disorderly acts following the explosion at Independence, June 6, by which many non-union miners were killed or injured. Previous to that there had been a large force of soldiers on duty for many months in the Cripple Creek district, but before the explosion occurred these had all been withdrawn. No troops are now under arms anywhere in Colorado, and good order prevails in all the mining camps.

The military expenses of the state during the last eighteen months, up to strikes, are said to aggregate about \$1,000,000.

To Fight Steel Trust.

Pottsville, Pa., July 28.—Stockholders of the Eastern Steel Company, an organization backed by the Vanderbilts, Archibald White and other big capitalists, today voted to increase the capital stock of the company from \$5,000,000 to \$20,000,000.

The sum of \$2,500,000 is to be used to complete the company's mammoth new plant in Pottsville, on which \$3,000,000 has been expended. These steel mills, furnaces, rolling mills, bridge works and blast furnaces, when completed, will be able to turn out 150,000 tons of steel annually. The company will fight the steel trust.

STOCKYARD MEN BACK AT WORK

Packers Say They Are Deserting Strikers in Large Numbers—A Maniac and a Knife.

Chicago, July 29.—According to the employers there were 13,475 men at work in the big packing plants here yesterday, taking the places of more than 35,000 strikers. Reports that freight handlers in the employ of the Chicago Junction railway companies went on strike were denied by officials of the company. According to President Skinner, of the Union Stock Yards and Transit Companies, 600 stock handlers became dissatisfied with the prospects of the strike and returned to work in the yards caring for the live stock.

Yesterday afternoon 133 men, all members of the union, deserted the strikers and returned to work at Armour & Co.'s plant. Twenty-eight of this number are carriers. The others are skilled butchers, who were formerly employed in the cattle, hog and sheep departments. Every man was put at work at once.

"We have got this strike right now," declared Supt. Conway, of Armour & Co., yesterday afternoon. "Every packer is going ahead as though there were no strike, and the operations are in full swing. The strikers are deserting and coming back in droves."

Word reached the union headquarters that two train loads of white and colored strike breakers, gathered in Buffalo, Cleveland and Cincinnati were stopped by strike sympathizers who flagged the train between Whiting and Hammond, Ind., and that the strike breakers were driven off and scattered. The trains belong to the Erie and Lake Shore roads. Their coming had been foretold by railroad men in sympathy with the strike, and the attack followed.

Intense excitement was aroused in the crowded exchange building in the stock yards by an attempt by a maniac to kill George J. Ward, a member of the commission firm of Alexander Ward & Co. Ward's appearance running through the building pursued by a man flourishing a big knife, created a general excitement. Before the beligerent could accomplish any harm, however, he was over-powered by a policeman. The assailant is a Ukrainian, unable to speak or understand English. He gave the name of Anton Dorekioz.

KAISER'S SON HAS CANCER

Prince Oscar Sent to Switzerland for Treatment.

Interlaken, Switzerland, July 28.—The two young sons of the Emperor, August Wilhelm and Prince Oscar, are now at the Heustrich Baths in Bernese Oberland, near Spiez at the foot of the great Neisen. The newspapers here have not referred to the illness of the fact there seems to be some secret agreement among them not to speak of their visit at all, but all the same is full of signs that the prince is ill.

The younger son, Oscar, who is about 14 years old, is seriously ill with a pulmonary complaint that has developed a growth in the lungs. The Emperor's trouble. In the case of the son it is stated on good authority that the growth is a cancerous nature.

The visit of Oscar was made with the earnest recommendation of the German physician, Dr. Gerhardt, an authority on the treatment of cancer, to the Kaiser to put the prince in special use there, would be directly beneficial.

Mrs. Johnson spent three years with her brothers, who are in the mines in the northern part of Korea, and shortly after the war was declared she, with several other women and five children, were ordered away by the American minister. The trip out was beset by many hardships.

The traveler tells an interesting episode connected with her arrest as a spy. She was attempting to take a picture of the Japanese minister of Mod, a beautiful city, when she was arrested. She had trouble in securing her release.

Toronto Young Man Fractures Skull at Crystal Beach.

Buffalo, N. Y., July 28.—In sight of hundreds of spectators, Oliver Belz, a young man, fell from a high diving board at Crystal Beach yesterday afternoon, and was seriously injured. Belz has been doing high diving for some time, and was well known to the water at Crystal Beach. He was brought to Buffalo, and taken to the general hospital, where it was found his skull had been fractured. Belz is expected to recover.

The performance of the young Toronto diver was regarded as a sensational, and a large crowd was at hand to witness his daring act. No sooner had he begun his act of "leaping the gap" than he apparently lost his self-control and plunged headlong from the diving board. A cry of horror went up from the crowd as his body fell, and several women fainted. He was picked up unconscious and medical aid was quickly summoned.
