

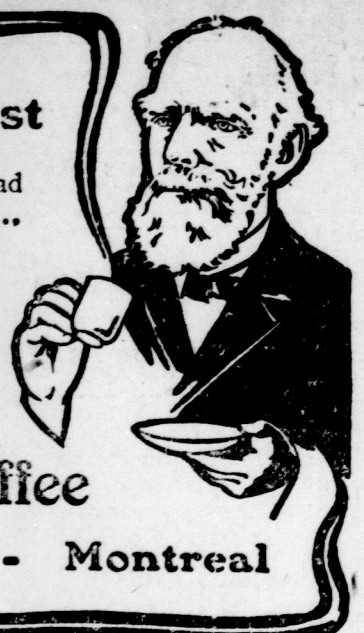

THE GREAT SANCI DIAMOND MAN HIDES HURT THUMB

Stone Worth \$500,000 Is Displayed at Astor Wedding.

London, Nov. 14.—Few know that William Waldorf Astor, besides owning some millions worth of jewelry, is the possessor of the great Sanci diamond, one of the most celebrated in the world, and valued at \$500,000. The fact was new to many on the wedding day of his daughter, for among the wealth of gems on the jewel table lay this monster brilliant, hidden away in a safe in Carlton House Terrace.

The Sanci diamond is said to equal in value and size such priceless stones as the Regent and Orleans, and is almost as large and correspondingly valuable as the celebrated Kohinoor. It has had many vicissitudes, having been lost, found and lost again. At last it came into the possession of Mr. Astor, who made sure of its safe-keeping.

Its history is as romantic as that of the famous ruby which blazed in the helmet of the Black Prince at Agincourt, and which, when the French among the priceless crown jewels at the coronation of King Edward, it belonged to Charles the Bold, Duke of Burgundy, and was purchased by Sir C. Jejeebhoy, the millionaire Parsee, from Prince Demidoff in 1865 for \$220,000.

\$5 EACH FOR BABIES

Chief Executive Offers Unique Prize In His Native Town.

London, Nov. 14.—Among the hundreds of mayors who have been elected this week is one who attracted considerable attention by a singular offer. The mayor of Huddersfield, in returning thanks for his election, said his desire was especially to have babies in his community.

He declared he would give the parents of every baby born in his native place, Longwood, during his year in office, a promissory note for \$5, to be paid when the baby reached the age of 1 year, together with some other simple, homely directions for the welfare of the child. He hoped that the offer would arouse in a certain measure attention to the question of infant mortality upon which the public conscience now is well-nigh dead.

The mayor added that he was not a plutocrat or he might make the offer apply to the whole borough. But as about 2,000 children are born in the borough each year it would be "rather a large order for him."

POPE'S POSITION AS TO CONCORDAT

Declares France Has Broken Faith, But Hopes for a Reconciliation.

Rome, Nov. 14.—In the secret consistory the Pope delivered an allocution recalling the origin of the concordat and the reasons which induced Pope Pius VII. to conclude it with Napoleon, especially referring to the provisions made for the appointment of bishops, the budget of the ministry of public worship, which was regulated by what was practically a contract, and, finally, the free exercise of Catholic worship. He added that the so-called organic articles added in 1802 by Napoleon had never been recognized by the Holy See, either as law or as being part of the concordat. Therefore the Pontiff deplored the fact that the present Government of the French Republic had under various pretexts charged the Holy See with not having observed the concordat, adding that the church had never in the case of any country infringed an agreement made. The Pope concluded with saying that the French Government has broken the fundamental conditions of the concordat, a proceeding which was not only in violation of the concordat, but which was also opposed to the natural law. The Pope complained of the impossibility, due to the existing state of affairs, of appointing bishops to the vacant sees in France, but expressed the hope that an understanding would be reached.

The majority of the cardinals present considered the allusion rather mild, and remarked that the Pope omitted the part on which he previously had consulted several of the cardinals, which he was to have appealed to the people of France, and to have urged Rome to be loyal to the church, and use their rights as citizens to prevent the Government from persecuting religion.

I.C.R.'S DEFICIT

Railway Was \$201,980 Behind for the First Quarter of Fiscal Year.

Ottawa, Nov. 15.—The earnings of the Intercolonial Railway for the first quarter of the current fiscal year, that is, up to the close of September, amount to \$1,850,485, an increase of \$52,832. The expenditure, however, in the same period was \$2,052,465, which leaves a deficit of \$201,980 on the operations of the road during July, August and September.

The increase of \$11,762 in the expenditure is due to increases in the wages enjoyed by the employees of the Intercolonial and to large improvements along the route.

ASKS ROPE FOR THUGS

Capital Punishment Recommended for Hold-Up Men.

Chicago, Nov. 15.—"In view of the prevalence of that phase of crime, known as the 'hold-up,' its brutality and the frequent loss of life resulting therefrom, we would respectfully petition the next general assembly to frame severe laws bearing thereon, even to the extent of capital punishment for such offenses." A resolution of this kind was introduced by a member of the Illinois legislature, who is a victim of the crime.

The foregoing recommendation for death punishment for armed robbers was drafted by the grand jury before adjournment, and followed the indictment of a dozen robbers, who were brought before the inquisitorial body.

NEW SPEED RECORD

700 Miles in 13 1-2 Hours Made by French Train.

Nice, Nov. 15.—"The Azure Coast Limited" train has made a new speed record. It is a service put on by the Lyons and Mediterranean Railway, and the first train yesterday made the trip between Paris and the Riviera in 700 miles, in 13 1/2 hours. During a part of the journey a speed exceeding 90 miles an hour was maintained.

M. Nobiletti, director of the road, asserts that the work of the new railway flyer is a complete answer to a remark recently made by W. K. Vanderbilt, who said that no train in France could equal the Twentieth Century Limited, between New York and Chicago.

Nobiletti says the Riviera train has beaten the American flyer and with time to spare.

Including stops, the French train made an average speed of nearly 50 miles an hour. The service, it is said, means increased prosperity for Southern France.

DREAM CAME TRUE

Fisherman Foresaw the Catastrophe That Met His Boat.

London, Nov. 15.—The story of a dream and its tragic realization is being a sensation among the fishing folk in the South Devon port of Brixham. With a great shriek of terror Walter Devon Furneaux, one of the crew of the trawler Lyra, aroused his wife and family early one morning.

Trembling with fright, he explained to Mrs. Furneaux that he had been terrified by a horrible dream.

On board the Lyra, he explained, "and saw a big steamer coming down on us. She struck our boat, and I saw it drowning."

During breakfast on the same day Furneaux seemed so depressed, and made frequent references to the scene which presented itself so vividly in his sleep. Mrs. Furneaux, who had become alarmed and endeavored to persuade her husband to remain at home during the next voyage of the Lyra to the fishing ground.

"Well, so I would," answered Furneaux, "if I thought I could get a hand to go in my place, but I suppose I should have some trouble to get anyone."

Later in the day the Lyra put to sea, her crew of five including Furneaux. All night they remained on the fishing grounds away out in the channel, and at daybreak the vessel was cruising about in company with other trawlers from the same port.

Suddenly a steamer, which proved to be the Heathbank of London, proceeding from Antwerp to Barry, crashed into the Lyra, cutting her in two, and a moment later she had sunk.

THE CONMEE ACT
Rumored That the Convention Will Ask Its Repeal.

Toronto, Nov. 14.—In prominent Liberal circles today it was reported that one of the requests to be made of the Government at the convention on the 22nd inst., will be the repeal of the Conmee act. This measure is said to be unpopular in those municipalities where gas, water, or electric light plants were operated by companies prior to the passing of that measure. It is contended that in these cases the Conmee bill imposes hardships on any municipality desiring to obtain control of these franchises. The contention is also made that in these days when public ownership is giving much attention, obstacles to the progress of that principle should be removed.

WOULD NOT CONSENT

Canon Cody Declines to Allow His Name To Go Before Huron Synod.

The Toronto Star of Monday says: That Toronto may lose one of its most popular preachers in Rev. Canon Cody, St. Paul's church, is again a possibility. Canon Cody is spoken of as the successor to the late Bishop Baldwin of Huron.

In the past he has refused several favorable offers on the ground that he was bound to St. Paul's Church because of the indebtedness that had been incurred in the recent improvements to the church building. This indebtedness has now practically been cleared off, as the result of the advisory committee to the church building, which he was to have appealed to the people of France, and to have urged Rome to be loyal to the church, and use their rights as citizens to prevent the Government from persecuting religion.

When spoken to in regard to the matter by the Star this morning, several prominent members of his congregation said that Canon Cody had refused to allow his name to go before the synod. The increase of the advisory committee of the church is to be held, and Canon Cody's action will in all probability be influenced by the decision of this body. If the committee decides that the congregation should not stand in the way of Canon Cody's advancement, it is given for making it.

Clover Leaf and the C. H. and D. to Become Part of the Erie.

Cleveland, Ohio, Nov. 14.—The Leader tomorrow will say: "The Erie Railway has closed a deal for the Cincinnati, Hamilton and Dayton, and the Clover Leaf Railroads, subject to a physical and financial inspection of the two lines. H. and D. has made itself conspicuous by a consolidation, the two railroads have drifted naturally together."
