### TWELVE YEARS FOR THOS. NOAH PLEAD GUILTY TO MANSLAUGHTER!

Plea Entered After Crown MAYOR STEVELY Had Conctuded Its Case.

JUDGE AGREED TO ALLOW IT

His Lordship Says There Is No Room for the Knife and the Revolver in Canada.

Thomas Noah, the accused Muncey Indian murderer, this morning pleaded guilty to manslaughter, and was sentenced to twelve years in the Kingston Penitentiary.

The prisoner took his sentence with a smile, and he was still smiling when he left the courtroom.

The case was taken from the jury at 9:30 this morning, upon the defense announcing that a plea of manslaughter would be entered.

When asked if he had anything to say, Noah replied in a firm voice, that he had nothing to offer.

Judge's Address. In passing sentence, his lordship emphasized the fact that the sentencing held in London this year. of a prisoner was not so much to punish him as to warn others.

It was a shame, he said, to see a serious of all crimes, murder.
