Nor is this the only unusual sight -real camels-are frequently hard at work cutting chaff.

Burstow Lodge, where the animals, which are the property of "Sanger's Circus," hibernate for four months, is the 400-acre farm of Mr. Lord John Sanger. In bright sunshine, though ground was white with frost at mid-

day, and all exposed water was covered with ice, Tiny, whose chief claim to her name appears to rest on the fact that she is far the largest of the four elephants at Burstow Lodge, plowed her lonely furrows merrily, her particular friend, Annie, looking on and encouraging her at intervals with jovial snorts. Tried to Sit on the Plow.

Annie also can turn a good furrow out she is a beginner, being only about sixty years of age, while Tiny is seventy or eighty at least. Annie was led out a few mornings ago alone to the fields, but resented the "new-fangled notion," as she regarded the plow, and trumpeted furiously. She further showed a disposition to

sit on the plow, which would have done her hide no good and certainly spoiled a useful agricultural implement. So she returned to the farm, and was ordered to clasp the tail of Tiny with her trunk. Then, in dignified

Is Becoming the Staple Domestic Fuel of the West.

The conservation and protection of our forests, fisheries, waterpowers and mines is now one of the most important and vital topics before the Canadian people. It is a question attracting not only national but international at-The conservation convention a leg and an arm to respond to the toast at Washington will try to formulate some international policy of mutual value to preserve the resources of the American continent. Recklessness and waste, together with increased consumption, have reduced timber and coal areas for example to comparatively small proportions, and some plan of systematic reforestation and protection of supply will have to be inaugurated. Not only is the timber of the coun-

try being slaughtered by lumbermen and destroyed by forest fires, but the merchantable coal has been found to be much smaller than was formerly believed. The forest beds, too, are disappearing, and even with the United States mines yielding upwards of 430,000,000 tons per year the wants of the world are not satisfied. It is a time, in fact, for serious consideration of the whole subject. With the next generation the calamity of dearer coal will be at hand. It is not a pleasant problem to face, but is one which society cannot afford to leave to posterity for solution. There is not enough wood left to affect materially the fuel problem, and the outlook for electrical heating is still probematical. The coal mines of Pennsylvania are dwindling rapidly and scarcity will make coal so costly that the people of the west particularly will be practically unable to purchase it.
