MRS. LINK EXPLAINS THE QUARANTINE CASE
Alleges That She Was Not Properly Treated By the Medical Health Officer.

A letter has been received by the Advertiser from Mrs. Link, of Ridout street, whose daughter was accused by the health authorities with breaking quarantine. She writes that the house was locked up before she had an opportunity of getting any supplies, and makes the statement that there were no provisions sent to the house for almost a week. The letter is as follows:

"I saw in the Saturday evening's issue of The Advertiser that Dr. Hutchison had a warrant issued for my daughter. He shut my house up on Saturday before I could get anything in to eat, and I had nothing from Saturday until this last Friday, except a little that our corner landlady brought to us on Wednesday, and that was only enough to last a day. I am just as much in fault as the girl, as I told her that there was no small-pox in the house. My husband and son were taken with the grip, and both of them broke out in a rash afterwards from bad blood. Those who have been sleeping with them have not contracted the disease. There are seven of us in the house, and none have contracted it. I am as much at fault as the girl, and if they want to arrest any person, they had better arrest both of us. The girl is not 20 years of age, but will be 17 on June 18. Sincerely yours,

NO SCHOOL PICNIC BOARD DECIDES

Said That It Interferes With the Studies of the Scholars.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENTS

May Well Be Made This Year at a Cost of \$36,000—Other Matters Before the Board Yesterday.

There will be no school picnic this year.
At the meeting of the board of education yesterday afternoon, it was decided not to have a picnic.
The board was practically unanimous this, and the \$300 "kiddies" will not have the pleasure of a ride to Springbank this summer at the expense of the city.

Trustee Strong brought the question up, and said that it was about time the board to hold the picnic. The entrance examinations were earlier than usual this year, and the picnic should take place early in June. He suggested that it be held on June 8.
Inspector Edwards thought the earlier the better.

Trustee Gammage thought it had better be held at the beginning of the holidays, as the attendance was generally poor when it took place early. He suggested any date in the term as possible.
Broke in on Studies.

Dr. Teasdale suggested to the board that they consider the advisability of holding a picnic. There was no doubt it broke in upon the teacher's work. A majority of the trustees considered the picnic a hindrance to the work for some days before and after the event. The day itself was a considerable strain upon them.

Trustee Gammage moved that the picnic be scheduled for July 1.
"We cannot get out on holidays, Wednesdays, nor Saturdays," said Trustee Graham.
Trustee Weeks also opposed the picnic, and stated that it was undoubtedly harmful to the children at this time of the year. It took their minds off their studies, and had no benefits.

"I withdraw my suggestion," said Trustee Strong. "A number of the trustees are against it, and as it is a matter of economy not to hold it, I will favor it."
Trustee Teasdale moved that the picnic be discontinued for this year.

Teachers Opposed To It.
"Ninety per cent of the teachers, and a large number of the parents are opposed to the picnic," said Dr. Teasdale. "Let us give them a chance this year."
His motion carried with little or no opposition.

The board decided yesterday to ask the council to issue debentures for the sum of \$36,000 to build the four-room addition to the Worley road school, and for lavatories and heating systems in several others.

New Works.
Four-room addition to the Worley road school, including new heating apparatus, new lavatories, and alterations \$15,000
Addition to the St. George's school, including new lavatories, and alterations 3,500
Rectory street, new lavatories 3,500
Empress avenue, new lavatories 3,500

Colborne Street School.
Dr. Teasdale objected to the expenditure of \$7,000 on the Colborne street school, a \$6,000 building. Trustee Gammage pointed out that it was necessary to make the improvements, as something had to be done to properly heat the school, and provide accommodation. The saving on fuel bills alone would more than pay the interest on the money invested. The plan would be outside the school, and it was never necessary to erect a new school, the heating plant would still be of use.

Fuel Supply.
The tenders for the fuel supply were awarded as follows: Hard coal, Cornell Coal Company, \$5.50 per ton; select lump, Youngs, John Mann & Sons, \$4.25 per ton; low wood, maple, J. A. McLurg, \$5.80 per cord; blocks, maple, J. A. McLurg, \$7.75 per cord.
The contract for lumber was awarded to the London Lumber Company, it being the lowest.

It was also decided to partition the assembly rooms at the Collegiate, to give more room for teaching.

Sand Pans.
Sand pans will be furnished the pupils of Grade 1, and the janitor of Simcoe street school will be paid at the same rate as the other janitors throughout the city.
The board of works were empowered to go ahead with the needed changes.
