

## BISHOP WILLIAMS EXPLAINS THE ATTITUDE OF CHURCH OF ENGLAND

His Lordship, in His Charge to the Synod of Huron, Said That if the Anglican Church Is Not Included in the Negotiations for Church Union, the Fault Is on the Other Side.

The Bishop of Huron's references to the church union are of much interest, and were given in the Synod of Huron on Tuesday afternoon. Now that the other communions had chosen to negotiate for unity, it behooved the Church of England to make known its position. The public is unthinking. To a multitude one church is as good as another. An attachment is determined simply by accident, not by principle or knowledge. To this multitude the Church of England stands aside. Two things he desired to emphasize. First, to show why the negotiations for church union are not included in the negotiations for unity, and then to point out the need of emphasizing the distinctive witness of the Anglican Church. The Church of England is not included in the negotiations for unity, for they have reached for unity long ago. It is the refusal of the other communions to acknowledge the Church of England's orders. The matter has been put in another way, and he desired to set it forth correctly. It is assumed that the chief obstacle to union between the Church of England and other communions was intolerance on the part of the Church of England, and the refusal of the Anglicans to acknowledge the validity of the orders of the other communions and that so long as the Anglicans continue such refusals organic union was impossible.

**Not a Fact.** "That allegation is not quite in accordance with fact," said his lordship. "At least, so far as this country is concerned. In the negotiations opened between the Anglicans and the joint committee of the Presbyterians, Methodists and Congregational churches, upon the subject of union, we were specifically told that unless we were prepared to consider the historic episcopate an open question—that is, a subject which was of no vital importance, and whose retention or abolition was to be decided by expediency—unless we were prepared for this they would not negotiate. In other words they were not prepared to accept the validity of our orders, as they are, and unless we were prepared to abandon episcopacy, which is the only means of leaving it an open question, the way was blocked. Such being the case the intolerance, I submit, was on the other side and not on our part on the side which said, 'Unless you are prepared to abandon one of the orders of the ministry as you have it, we shall not negotiate with you.'"

## DELAWARE FARMERS SHOULD STAY RIGHT IN ONTARIO

Mr. R. L. Smith Is Growing as Fine Apples, Peaches and Berries as Are to be Found Anywhere in the Province, and Is Putting In More.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Delaware, June 11.—Prospects are bright for a bumper crop of apples in this vicinity. The farmers have awakened to the fact that if they spray and prune their orchards, the larger crop will be, and the fruit of a better quality.

Mr. R. L. Smith, proprietor of the Delaware Fruit Farm, says that he never before saw the apple trees so well loaded as they are this year, and as he has taken first-class care of his orchard, he looks for No. 1 fruit. A number of other farmers in this vicinity have purchased spraying outfits, and are attending to their orchards.

**A Big Producer.**

Mr. Smith has gone into fruit farming quite extensively. In the spring of 1911 he planted 250 peach trees, which are doing well, and reports a growth

on some of the trees of three and one-half feet for the first year. This spring he planted 500 more peach trees. Mr. Smith says he cannot see the reason why peaches could not be grown here as well as in the Forest district. He has also planted out this spring 350 grapevines, 200 red and black currant bushes, 10,000 strawberry plants, and 40 plum trees. Mr. Smith has also four acres of raspberries under cultivation, and has a large patch of strawberries for this year's picking.

**As Good as the Best.** There is no section of Western Ontario where strawberries are grown any more successfully than in this vicinity. Mr. R. L. Smith has as good a patch of strawberries as anyone would wish to look at. Mr. E. Cummings, Mr. George Hay, J. Turnbull, J. Fosslett, D. Hay and Robinson Bros. are also extensive growers of strawberries.

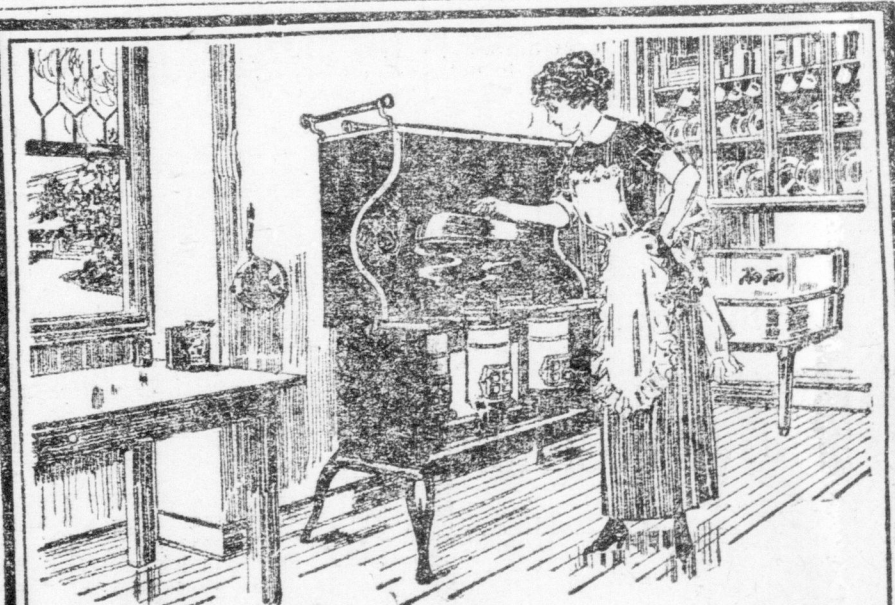
