WORK BEGINS ON THE

NEW FACTORY IN SPRING

McCormick Mfg. Co. Secure

Land on Dundas St.

East.

The McCormick Manufacturing Com-

pany have announced that they have

purchased a large block of land on

Dundas street, on the north side, east

of the Empire Brass Works, as the site

for their new factory. The price was

\$75,000. A portion of it will be utilized

as sites for residences of the em-

ployees, who desire to live in the

neighborhood, and whose homes will be

erected by the company.

The main building will have a front-

age of 300 feet on Dundas street. Three

other buildings will be grouped about it,

one 225 by 100 feet, another 110 by

80 feet, and a third, 110 by 70 feet. The

most of them will be three stories in

height, although a portion of one of

the buildings will be one story.

The factory will be one of the most

modern, fireproof in every respect, and

with all possible facilities for handling

the firm's large business.

In addition, another industry, man-

ufacturing a product largely used by

the McCormick Company, will erect a

plant next to them. It will be a big

industry, employing at least 50 men to

begin with.

Will Tear Down Old Factory.

Work will be commenced in the

spring, and will be rushed to com-
pletion as rapidly as possible. The oldfactory will be torn down. It is ex-
pected that the present plant will be

removed by the autumn, and the new

one will be in operation.

The company will place a number of

their employees on a portion of the

land purchased. Some time ago, they

intimated to the men that they would

be given an early opportunity of ac-

quiring lots at a reasonable figure, and

they have carried this plan out. They

will undertake to build houses for the

men, and will give reasonable terms

of payment. It is understood that

many employees will avail themselves

of this opportunity.

Absolute Rot.

East End near the McCormick Com-

pany's plant, but this was denied by

Mr. Forristal.

"It is absolute rot," declared Mr. John
