CARNEGIE TO BE ASKED FOR GRANT TO LIBRARY

Matter of Assistance With View to New Building Up at Next Meeting.

The possibility of a grant from Andrew Carnegie for a new library in this city is to be discussed at the next meeting of the Carnegie library board. It is probable that a substantial donation will be requested, and that application will be made immediately.

At the last meeting of the board, M. P. McDonagh, chairman, brought up the question, although it was discussed only informally, several members seemed to be in favor of making an application.

In the event of a new structure being planned for the present library building, which is in a fine condition, would be sold, and a new library erected on the federal square property.

FREE TRIMMING TO BE WIDELY DONE

Mr. Glaubitz Says More Than \$1,200 May Be Spent to Advantage.

Considerable tree-trimming will be done throughout the city by the parks commission this year, it being the contention of some of the members that there are hundreds of trees on the city streets which are too thick and whose branches are too low.

In the estimates for this year \$1,200 was placed for this work, but General Manager Glaubitz explained when asking for that amount that considerable more money could be utilized for this work if it could be secured.

The work will have to be done in the early spring or fall, and men will likely be started on the work as soon as the weather gets a little milder.

LONDON MAY TRY CEMENT PAVEMENTS

Is Used in Other Places With Success and Cheaper Than Brick or Asphalt.

The advisability of constructing several cement pavements in London, similar to those on a number of streets in Windsor, Sarnia and Detroit, will be brought up at the next meeting of the board of works.

Using cement for pavements, instead of vitrified brick and asphalt, has already passed the experimental stage, and in cities where they have been tried they are giving satisfaction. The cost of the cement pavement is considerably less than that of other kinds; in fact, they are cheaper, and as soon as the weather permits several cement pavements be constructed on the streets which are in such bad condition in South London.

Following is a table of the approximate cost of the different types of permanent pavements, exclusive of costs:
