[Canadian Press.] Detroit, Mich., May 13 .- Not a city street car was being operated in Detroit at 7 o'clock this morning as the result of a strike called by Detroit United Railway conductors and motormen because of the company's refusal to reinstate a motorman who had been discharged for

alleged carelessness in the handling of his car. The strike vote was taken during the early morning hours and was practically unanimous. Although the walkout had been threat-ened for 24 hours, thousands of factory employees and downtown workmen, who had depended on the street cars, were from one to three hours late in reporting at their work. They declared, however, the men had violated terms of their working agreement with the com-pany, in that they had not first submit-ted their case for arbitration.
