Camp Borden Orders Have
Col. Bradley Resigned.

GREYS FIRST TO SAIL

Officers of Western Ontario
Brigade Are Learning
Horsemanship.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
CAMP BORDEN, Oct. 4.—In the 8th Brigade orders today authority was granted for Lieut.-Col. T. P. Bradley, officer commanding the 14th, 15th and 16th Grey Battalions, to resign his command and to revert to the rank of captain. He is also granted the brevet rank of lieutenant-colonel in the C. E. F.

Col. Bradley is on leave and in his absence Major W. W. McVicar, senior major of the brigade, is in command and it is expected that he will be promoted to the rank of lieutenant-colonel to command the unit.

The 8th Brigade has been holding a school of equitation for instructional purposes for over a week in an effort to make all the officers efficient in horsemanship.

Greys First to Go.

Most of the Western Ontario battalions are either on leave or will leave tomorrow morning for their monthly furlough. The 14th Grey Battalion will return tomorrow, and it is said that it will be the first unit to leave camp for overseas.

Sgt. Ronald Kerr, aged 19, of the 12th Muskoka Battalion, died in the camp hospital from pneumonia. His father, mother and one sister survive him at his home at Port Hope, Ont.

Lieut. Chitty of the district intelligence officers' staff headquarters, late of the 3rd Battalion, was admitted to the hospital tonight, suffering from pleurisy.

To Revisit Winter Quarters.

Major-General W. A. Leitch and Lieut.-Col. E. C. Osborne, left for Ottawa tonight to confer with the parliamentary under-secretary regarding the rearrangement of winter quarters. Another matter for discussion will be the movement and warning of other units for overseas and the dates for No. 1 Division battalions to their winter billets.

Officially Announced
Col. Reid's New Appointment Mentioned
in Dispatches.

Official confirmation of the story appearing in The Advertiser of some days ago that Col. Frank Reid of this city was to be the new adjutant-general of the Canadian overseas forces, comes in a cable dispatch from the old country. In announcing the new appointment, now officially confirmed, it says that Col. F. A. Reid is acting adjutant-general.

Recruits Have to Pass It at Armories Here.

Recruits enlisted in Middlesex, Lambton, Kent, Perth, Huron, Oxford and Kitchener (Three Counties) will be sent to the Armory in London for final medical examination by a board. This is the arrangement made under the new mobilization scheme now in force in this district. The district will be divided into three divisions, with W. H. Irvine in charge of one division, with headquarters at the Armories here.

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LIEUT.-COL. McCRIMMON TO BE IN TORONTO SATURDAY

Leaves to Take Up New Duties in No. 2 District.

Lieut.-Col. W. A. McCrimmon, O. and L. C. C. and late acting A. A. G. of No. 1 military district, has been ordered to report in Toronto Saturday, October 7, and will take up his duties as O. and L. C. C. of No. 2 military district on Tuesday of next week.

His duties in connection with the Cadet Corps of this district will be taken over by Capt. Barclay, who has been acting O. and L. C. C. for some weeks.

Lieut.-Col. McCrimmon has had many years' experience in connection with the Cadet Corps, and was certain that his well-known abilities would be utilized. While No. 2 district usually has two officers to handle the work of the corps there, they have both been sent overseas for duty. Lieut.-Col. McCrimmon will be attached to the staff of No. 2 district in his new capacity.

TWO LONDON MEN RETURNING HOME

Capt. Scandrett Will Resume Military Duties Here.

The latest list of men returning from England to Canada on sick furlough or for other reasons, contains the names of two Londoners.

One name is given as W. A. Lyons. This is the name of Lieut. R. A. Lyons of this city, although his people have received no confirming cable. He was attached to the 16th Battalion going overseas at the beginning of the war. He was wounded August 7th, after 18 months' service. He has been expecting a sick furlough for some time, but has written no letters home for several weeks.

The other Londoner is Capt. J. H. Scandrett, who is to resume his duties in Canada. L. H. Scandrett, his father, has received a cable confirming his departure from England, but giving no further information. Capt. Scandrett left Canada with the 6th Field Battery as a lieutenant. In France he won the military cross. He was injured while serving as an artillery observer in the Royal Flying Corps, and returned home, and on his recovery was attached as an instructor to the 19th Artillery Brigade at Petawawa. He sailed for England four weeks ago.

CARPENTERS URGENTLY NEEDED BY ENGINEERS

Recruits Wanted by Special Service Company—Good Pay.

Carpenters are still urgently wanted by the Engineers' Special Service Company. A great deal of work has to be done in connection with preparing the buildings at Queen's Park for occupancy by the troops, and it is said that 25 men are needed at once.

The summer establishment of the Engineers was 75 men, but an order was issued authorizing the increase of the strength to 100 men, and it is to obtain these that the Engineers have instituted a recruiting campaign. Very few men have responded in spite of the extra pay which it is possible to earn. The usual \$1.10 per day is paid, with a separation allowance in the case of married men amounting to 40 cents a day, and the chance of earning an additional 40 cents a day, which is given to those qualified in their work.

Recruits are being accepted at the headquarters of the corps at Camp Borden, and at any regular recruiting office.

GARRISON TO PARADE

All Troops Will March to Church on Sunday.

All troops in the garrison will march to the First Methodist Church for a combined service on Sunday morning next. The service, which will be conducted by Rev. Dr. Flanders, will be held at 9:45 a.m.

No details of the order or route of march have been decided on, but all units and corps will be out in full strength. The 14th and 16th Battalions, the Engineers, A. S. C. A. and A. M. C. will be in line, in all about 1,800 men.

149TH ON WAY HOME

Goes to Sarnia From Camp Borden—Returns Tuesday.

The 149th Battalion, en route from Camp Borden to Sarnia, passed through the city by special Grand Trunk train at 1:30 o'clock today. A store of special, consisting of fourteen coaches and a baggage car, left Camp Borden at 7 o'clock this morning, and made a fast run to the city.

The return trip will be made on Tuesday morning next, the battalion to enroute at Sarnia at 11 o'clock and the train scheduled to depart from here at 1:30 o'clock. A store of minutes will be made here on Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock.

COMPLAINTS UP

West London Objections to Breakwater Coming Before Controllers.

The board of control on Friday afternoon will probably deal with the complaints of West London citizens relative to the foot path along the breakwater. From information received it seems likely that sufficient room will be given to pedestrians to walk along the breakwater. This would satisfy the residents of that district.

FOUR BATTALIONS WILL NOT RETURN TO THIS DISTRICT

Definite Word of the 110th, 142nd, 161st and 168th.

OTHER MOVES UNCERTAIN

London Likely To Have at Least Two Battalions For Winter.

Definite word was received yesterday at militia headquarters announcing that the 110th, 142nd, 161st and 168th Battalions would not return to No. 1 Military District for the winter. This is the first authoritative word that has been received locally in connection with the location of troops.

It is assumed that all other units including the 63rd and 64th Batteries, the 13th, 14th, 15th and 16th Battalions will return to their district for the winter. In addition the 241st is already here.

SOME TO BE DISAPPOINTED.

Various municipalities were bending every effort to the securing of at least some troops for the winter, but nothing definite has been decided. London has been practically promised at least two battalions and it is practically assured that the batteries will go to Guelph. This leaves only three battalions for the half-score or more of towns which want men.

Must Offer Inducements.

Col. L. W. Shannon is working on the problem and it is known that only those towns which offer the very best facilities for the training and accommodation of the men will secure them.

Rumors have been current for some time that the 149th Battalion would also be included among those to be sent overseas at an early date. If the London unit is sent, the demands of the municipalities will be still harder to satisfy.

INFANTRY OFFICERS BECOME FLYING CORPS MEMBERS

Leave Tonight for East and Eventually England.

Three unattached infantry officers have been accepted into the Royal Flying Corps and will leave London this evening for Ottawa to report to Capt. Lord Dunsford. They will probably be sent to England at an early date.

Lieut. A. Elvatt of Theford, Lieut. J. A. Hutchinson, Fordwick and Lieut. N. R. Anderson of Wharncliffe road, city, are the three officers. On their arrival in England they will be trained in one of the regular army training depots, and will be under no personal expense in the meantime. Other officers have applied for admission to the Flying Corps, and will be examined and if accepted will also be sent to England.

NO PROPER SYSTEM OF STREET CLEANING

So Says Controller Moore, But He Believes in New Flusher.

Controller John M. Moore, who reported favorably on the street flusher now in use on the streets, states that the machine will do good service, and will do all the work it was intended to do, when a proper system is employed. The advertiser is perfectly correct in saying that it will not remove the refuse, said Controller Moore. "I am positive of that. It takes a deal of scraping to get some of the stuff off the roads. What should be done is to have men follow the flusher and clean the streets, with the wagon close behind. In that way we will have perfectly clean streets and at a much lower cost than ever before. There is no system now, and the criticisms are well taken. We hope to have some improvement shortly, and then I think there will be no reasons for complaining. I am sure that the flusher will do good work, when the machine is properly handled, and a proper system of street cleaning adopted. At present we have neither."

NO RECENT CASES OF INFANTILE PARALYSIS

Medical Officer Does Not Expect Any Further Outbreak Here.

Notwithstanding reports from other Canadian cities to the effect that infantile paralysis epidemic is raging unchecked, the situation here has remained unchanged for weeks.

The latest case reported was September 19 and not even a suspected case has been brought to the notice of the medical officer of health since that date.

Dr. H. W. Hill does not anticipate any further outbreak but urges that citizens continue to use vigilance and watch for the slightest symptoms. The disease has been studied by the world's greatest scientists but they are unable to determine its causes and when it is most apt to appear.

It has been generally conceded to be a hot weather disease and four-fifths to a greater extent in the summer than in the winter but medical records show, according to Dr. Hill, that Sweden has suffered from poliomyelitis epidemics in the winter with a temperature below zero. Under these circumstances, Dr. Hill stated that he could not predict anything regarding the disease but believed that the worst was past.

ARBITRATORS EXPECTED TO BE NAMED TODAY

Utilities Commission Will Advance Macgregor Wells Purchase Scheme.

The utilities commission will meet this afternoon and will once more discuss the Macgregor wells. The board of control has notified the commission that the purchase is a matter for the commission to deal with, and there will be a motion introduced to have the commission appoint the necessary arbitrators and deal with the problem properly.

The question of building the hydro electric building will be presented. Tenderers will probably be called for.

Other questions will engage the attention of the commissioners.

NO SERVICE IN RUTHERN.

RUTHERN, Oct. 4.—There will be no service in the Methodist Church here next Sunday. The pastor, Rev. C. L. Couzens, will attend other appointments.

Y. M. C. A. DECLINING TO PROVIDE SLACKERS' CLUB

Will Devote Energies to Soldiers and Boys.

The Y.M.C.A. will start a campaign next week, to raise funds for the association. With the increase in responsibilities of the association, the need of more funds is apparent.

"We have only two classes to look after," said an official. "The boys and the soldiers. The boys are too young for military service, and we will have nothing to do with any others except the boys in khaki. We are not going to furnish a \$50-a-year-club to these young men who don't enlist for \$5 a year. Last year we gave baths and accommodation to 32,000 soldiers, an average of over 1,000 a day. We will provide smoking rooms for the soldiers and look after them in every possible way."

"What is more valuable than a boy? We must look after them. The Y.M.C.A. is the best institution in the land for looking after them, and I feel that the citizens will do well by them."

Although few men have received invitations to traveling man street in a check for \$50. Save the boys, and the nation will take care of itself, is the slogan, and there will be a hearty response to the appeals.

TRAGIC ENDING TO FISHING PARTY IN RIVER THAMES

James Brandon Drowns and Companion Narrowly Escapes.

TRY TO CHANGE SEATS

Boat Capsizes in Middle of River, Almost on Spot of Victoria Disaster.

The River Thames added another to its long list of victims last night when James Brandon of 320 Dundas street, was drowned, and A. J. Clark of 214½ Dundas street, narrowly escaped death when the rowboat in which they were fishing capsized as the result of an accident.

The scene of the drowning is about 25 feet this side of the scene of the Victoria disaster.

According to the story of Clark, who is manager of the Little Big Bargain Store, he and Brandon left the foot of Dundas street in a rowboat about 8 o'clock last evening.

Proceeding down the river at a slow rate of speed, Brandon was doing the rowing, while Clark in the rear of the boat was steering, and at the same time trolling for fish.

Victim Heavily Clothed.

Brandon was attired in a heavy sweater coat and overcoat, and when nearing a point nearly opposite the Victoria disaster monument he suggested to Clark that they change places. Clark agreed, and Brandon arose from the back of the boat. Clark was just at the point of arising from his seat when the boat suddenly capsized, and both were thrown in opposite directions into the water.

Clark Collapses on Bank.

Being nearly in the centre of the river Clark, who was heavily clothed, was unable to reach shore, and then collapsed and lay face down in the water. He was unconscious for some minutes.

His first thoughts were of Brandon and he called several times for him, failing to receive any response to his calls. Managing to get to the nearest farm house he had the police and fire departments summoned.

First Aid by Body.

On arrival of Chief Aiken and four men with the dragging apparatus at the river Clark pointed out the scene of the accident. The fishermen, who at once commenced dragging, were unable for the body. Clark was rushed into the city in an automobile and was attended by Dr. H. A. Stevenson.

Clark's story stated that he had never been able to swim over ten feet before and how he managed to swim from the centre of the river he could not explain. He made a superhuman effort, knowing it was a case of life and death.

Wife Begged Brandon Not to Go.

The husband party was not even recovered at 2:30 this afternoon.

The dragging operations in the river have been greatly retarded owing to the presence of quantities of wire, stumps and other debris which has accumulated there for years.

The firemen will continue their operations until successful in recovering the body.

Clark is confined to his bed today as a result of his experience, and Mrs. Brandon is under the care of Dr. Homer Black as a result of shock.

MOTHER WHO DESERTED BABY IS GIVEN CHANCE

Sentence Suspended on Dorothy Sutcliffe, Who Has Obtained Position.

Magistrate Judd suspended sentence today in the case of Dorothy Sutcliffe, who pleaded guilty two weeks ago to abandonment of her two-months-old babe in Grand Trunk train.

The babe has been placed in a good home temporarily, and Miss Sutcliffe, who secured employment at the home of a well-known citizen following her arrest, will continue at the same place and pay for her baby's board until such time as she can manage to take it herself.

The abandonment of the baby was preceded by a pitiful struggle on the part of the young woman to care for her child, and only in a moment of desperation, when she saw no other outlet, did she leave the child.

hoping it would fall into hands that could give it better care than she was capable of doing.

Her efforts to care for the child and look after it since placed in its new home proves that the young woman took the action she did contrary to her nature and instinct and left it because she believed it best.

regard to these contributions by Carter to the campaign fund?"

"No, neither directly nor indirectly."

"Had he any knowledge of the receipt of these moneys?"

"He certainly had not."

"Had he any knowledge of these contributions at any time?"

"None."

"Did Mr. Rogers ever receive directly or indirectly any dollar of this money?"

"Never."

Millions Vanished.

"It appears," said Phillips, "that approximately a million or a million and a half of the people's money has disappeared in the Agricultural College, and I propose to find where it has gone."

Mr. Phillips said he intended to re-trace his questions.

Dr. Simpson said some money was given him by W. H. Carter, contractor of the Agricultural College. He couldn't swear to the exact amount, but he had reason to doubt Carter's statement that \$15,000 had been paid.

"That," he said, "was the full amount of money received by me, or money I knew to have been received from any contractor in connection with the Agricultural College." He said he knew of no contribution by Thomas Kelly & Sons. Witness said he kept these funds in a box in the Royal Trust Company's vaults not separated from other funds. He received cash from Carter. 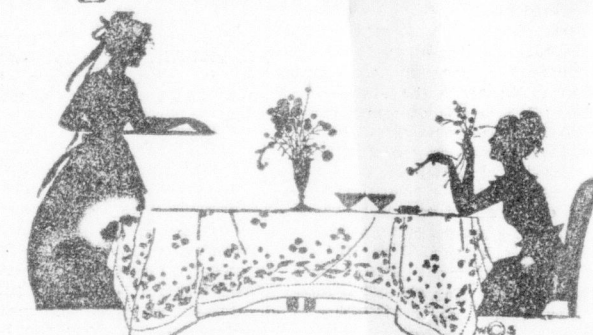
