

BERLIN OFFICIALS HAVE NEW OFFER ON REPARATIONS

German Proposal Believed To Give Real Guarantees On Payments.

BRITISH AWAITING Latest Proposition Will Be Sub- mitted For Allies' Con- sideration.

London, March 15.—Germany is about to make declaration that she is willing and ready to produce a plan for the final settlement of the reparations question, provided she can rely on the plan receiving the attention and consideration of the Allied governments, says the Daily Telegraph's diplomatic correspondent, upon whose information the Daily Telegraph in editorial says the fullest reliance may be placed.

Will Not Reveal Plan.
According to the correspondent, the plan, which involves a material guarantee by the German industrialists, will not be disclosed until the German government is assured that it will not be brushed aside without serious examination, as happened to Karl Bergmann's proposals in London in December and in Paris in January.

Unofficial or semi-official envoys from Berlin, German correspondents, recently caused inquiries to be made of the British cabinet whether the cabinet would not take the lead by suggesting that a conference from Germany would be convened in London, but that the British statesmen were reluctant to commit themselves.

Will Submit Policy.
This attitude of reserve, says the writer, disappointed not only the German government, but other governments who had been looking to Great Britain for the lead. The correspondent suggests that Germany is fully prepared to accept far-reaching measures of international control of her finances and to participate in some international organization.

France respecting France's treaty frontiers.
According to a despatch to the Daily Mail from Berlin, Herr Brüning, German minister of finance, intends to speak in the Reichstag next Tuesday, when some of the people expect a constructive policy on reparations which would lead to a settlement of the Ruhr situation.

SAYS DAIRY FARMING
TOO MUCH SPECIALIZED

Professor Barton Claims Too Many Farms Are Not Self-Sustaining.

Ottawa, March 15.—The dairy farming, an outlet for farmers of Eastern Canada, in the face of increased land values, had been too highly specialized by many farmers was the contention of Professor Barton of MacDonald College, appearing this afternoon before the special committee on agriculture. Too many farms were no longer self-sustaining, he said. Men had gone into dairying to the exclusion of everything else and did not even produce their own vegetables and eggs.

Professor Leitch of Guelph, recalled, said that the three best dairymen made as good butter as any country, but the Ontario and Quebec produce made a bad reputation for all Canadian butter. Ontario dairymen produced only enough butter for home consumption and the people at home were not very particular.

COMMONS RIDICULES PLAN TO REDUCE PAY

Harry Leader, Portage La Prairie, Suggests Reduction of Indemnities.

Ottawa, March 15.—Rising amid laughter from both sides of the House, Harry Leader, Progressive member for Portage La Prairie, suggested yesterday afternoon for a 12½ per cent reduction in the indemnities of members of the House of Commons and Senate and of the salaries paid to the ministers and to the leader of the opposition.

Mr. Leader said that he would be willing to cut his remarks right off at the outset and have a vote on the resolution if the House was willing.

There were cries, however, of "Excuse me" from all over the House, and amid much laughter he went on to say that most resolutions on the subject asked for an increase. That was what the people of the country were used to.

That the resolution was in the interest of economy was obvious, he went on, and so was the need for economy. However, everybody was willing to economize for the other fellow and continued to hang on to the higher indemnities voted in 1920.

RESUME EXECUTIONS
TO CHECK IRISH CRIME

Free State Government Acts in All Cases With Great Promptitude.

Dublin, March 15.—The resumption of executions by the Free State government is in pursuance of the policy announced when amnesty was offered. During the amnesty period all executions were suspended, and the presumption that all refusing amnesty were irreclaimable and must take the consequences.

The executions which have since taken place are for the most part not connected with old offences, but are punishments for offences subsequent to the amnesty offer. A notable feature has been the promptitude, some of them being executed within a few days of the offence.

The executions have been mostly confined to those who made direct attacks on the government, but some were inflicted for robbery of banks, which has been frequent. The total number of executions to date is 67.

FIRE DESTROYS CAR
WHEN WIRE HITS PIPE

Brantford-Hamilton Trolley Becomes Total Loss At Cainsville.

Brantford, March 14.—A Brantford-Hamilton radial car was destroyed last night under somewhat peculiar circumstances. While on a trip from Hamilton, and when passing Cainsville at the overhead bridge, the trolley wire sagged and touched the stovepipe, which protruded through the roof. A short circuit followed and a fire was the result.

As there was no apparatus on the car with which to fight the flames a message was sent to the Brantford Fire Department. The chief and four firemen responded, but on arrival at the scene found that they could not do anything in the absence of an adequate water supply. However, they managed by the use of chemicals to prevent the destruction of one of the high tension poles, which had become ignited.

The car is a complete wreck, only the ironwork and an undercarriage remaining. The passengers and crew of the car managed to escape without injury.

The loss is estimated in the neighborhood of \$18,000.

GALT SPENDS \$169,213.57
FOR UTILITIES BUILDING

STORMY SCENES MARK PRESBYTERY MEETING

Proposal Finally Carries Montreal Presbytery by Vote of 44 to 24.

HEARTY OPPOSITION
Dr. Dickie Declares Sentiment in Church Against Union Is Stronger Than For Years.

Montreal, March 15.—Stormy scenes, necessitating the frequent cry of "Order! Order!" from the moderator to recalcitrant clergy, who persisted in speaking out of their turn, marked the session of the Presbytery of Montreal yesterday, when the members were asked to record their final vote on the question of church union. The motion, urging the general assembly to proceed without further delay to the consummation of organic union, was carried by a standing vote, the result being 44 in favor and 24 opposed.

The commissioners to the forthcoming general assembly, who were elected earlier in the day had been elected moderator for the ensuing year frequently had his hands full in insisting that the proper procedure of the meeting be followed.

"The minority cannot be swept into union against its will," Dr. Dickie, amidst applause. "The tone of the opposition is confident. They believe they are going to sweep the whole church in, but I am quite confident that the rank and file of the people, the opposition to union is more determined today than at any other time during the last ten years. Whether we like it or not, our expression of opposition here today will be heralded from one end of the Dominion to the other as the expression of Presbyterianism in this district."

WANT SUNDAY BURIALS
IN BRANTFORD BANNED

Ministers Sign Petition Asking Council To Enact Bylaw.

Brantford, March 15.—A petition has been signed by 26 leading ministers of the city and forwarded to the city clerk, asking that a bylaw be passed prohibiting burials in the cemetery at Brantford on Sunday, except in the case of contagious diseases. It will be presented to the city council at the next meeting. The petition is also signed by the men employed in the cemeteries.

This petition is the result of strong feeling on the part of ministers that there is no need to hold funerals on Sunday. With the services in the morning and evening, Sunday School in the afternoon, and various other additional Sabbath duties imposed by the ministers, it is felt that some consideration should be given to them.

The men at the cemeteries take a similar view, feeling that to be called on to work on Sunday, when every other workman in the city is resting, is unfair and should be remedied.

SHOWS HIGH RECORD

Oxford Rifles Unit Gains Twelfth Place in Dominion.

King George To Entertain British Labor Leaders

Ramsay MacDonald, J. R. Clynes, J. H. Thomas, Philip Snowden and Wives To Be Guests At Buckingham Palace.

London, March 15.—Britain's Labor leaders are ready to make their debut into court society.

For the first time in history, the King of England Thursday is to entertain in Buckingham Palace the radicals in British politics.

Although King George has long been known as a democratic ruler, he is creating a sensation unprecedented in the world's dynasties—a sovereign becoming clubby with a group of possible future national administrators, whose so-called revolutionary ideas have been bitterly assailed by the nation's press as threatening to undermine all traditions of old England.

Will Break Bread.
Four Laborites and their wives are to break bread with His Majesty Thursday night. They are Ramsay MacDonald, leader of the opposition in the Commons; J. R. Clynes, general secretary of the National Union of General Workers; J. H. Thomas, general secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen; and Philip Snowden, foremost Labor leader in the Commons.

The spectacle of Ramsay MacDonald, radical exponent of the capital levy and other socialist doctrines, going to Buckingham Palace to dine at the table of the British Majesty strikes particularly memorable note in British history.

It steadily becomes more apparent that Labor and Tories are to have a Labor government—a day the thought of which strikes dismay in the hearts of Tory England. King George and the Laborites would seem to be merely undergoing the process of being introduced to each other in preparation for a time when MacDonald or some other Laborite might reside at Downing street.

The meeting of the king and the Labor leaders in Buckingham Palace follows shortly the reduction of the Tory majority in the House of Commons. Premier Bonar Law, facing the combined opposition of the Labor and Liberal party, had only 48 votes to spare Tuesday when a ballot was taken on the House's attitude toward the French occupation of the Ruhr.

Genius Will Carry Through.
The expression of the Daily Express is considered significant. "The genius of our race and the flexibility of our social order will carry us through all stages of social and constitutional evolution," the newspaper says in discussing the dinner. The paper adds that the historic traditions of the pomp and pageantry of the throne and the dignity of genuine democracy have merged into a common understanding which provides the bulwark against a violent change.

Lady Astor, with her American wit and American money, started the process of healing the breach between capital and labor, between the new and the old orders. The efforts of Lady Astor, who has frequently introduced the Laborites to the court at a dinner given at her home a week ago, are not only social but political. She has frequently reconciled Labor and Conservative elements in the Commons.

Other Labor leaders of less prominence are to be entertained at tea by the king Friday afternoon.

Vamps Man's Wife, Is Asked To Fight

Detroit, March 15.—Frank Lovia's lack of control over his teeth has forced him to assume the worrying end of a \$25,000 suit for alienation of affections. He is being sued by Mrs. Lovia on a charge of pirating the affections of his wife, Lena.

Lovia formerly roomed in the Closey home at 108 Brady street. When it became apparent to her husband, Lovia was ejected. He promptly moved to a room next door.

Three days ago, however, the husband says, he found the former roomer in his house. The husband caught his arm and applied sharp teeth to Closey's forefinger. Closey at once took stern steps to institute a suit.

Closey exhibited a heavily-wrapped index finger today as he talked in the hallway of his home. Far in the rear, Mrs. Closey hovered near a partly-closed door.

"He bit me," said the husband, the gleam of the avenger in his eye. "That's just like him. He won't come out in the open. He won't guess she likes him, but I'm not going to step out without a fight. I don't care about the money. I just want to protect my home and my four children."

"And I'll show him he can't bite my finger and get away with it."

GOVERNMENT TO BETTER WOODSTOCK GIRL HURT
BY FALLING OFF TRUCK

Announces Plans For Improvements and Remodeling of Pier.

Woodstock, March 15.—The minister of marine and fisheries has notified the town clerk that a dredge will be sent here as soon as navigation opens to begin work on the harbor. MAN DIES IN DETROIT
WHEN SEWER CAVES IN

John Schmuck Is Killed and Several Have Narrow Escape While Working.

FOUND GUILTY ON CHARGE
OF DEFAUDING CREDITORS

Montreal, March 15.—Charged with defrauding his creditors to the extent of \$15,000, Theodore Parent of Sherbrooke, Que., was yesterday found guilty by Judge Monet and condemned to pay a fine of \$200 and costs, or spend six months in jail.

It was claimed by his creditors that Parent, after failing in business, gave away a large part of the stock on the National Bank of Montreal in the 30 days previous to the failure. Parent ordered on credit from different wholesale firms over \$2,000 worth of goods. When sold, only \$313 worth of goods was found.

INSTRUCTION TO STOP REMOVAL OF ASSETS

Twenty Shareholders of Chain Store Stock Take Action Today.

DELAY APPLICATION
Court Suggests Delay Until After Meeting of the Creditors.

Toronto, March 15.—The effort to restrain the removal of assets of the L. R. Steel Companies out of Ontario took definite form, when D. J. Coffey, acting for about twenty shareholders, moved before the registrar in bankruptcy, George S. Holmsted, K.C., for an injunction. Mr. Coffey took the ground that the L. R. Steel Development Company held a quantity of land without any license to hold land in mortmain. The court took the view that as these assets could not be removed from the jurisdiction, the application had better stand over till after a meeting of the creditors.

In the meantime the position with regard to real estate held by an unlicensed company is being examined, and steps may be taken to forfeit the land to the crown, following which it would be available for distribution among Canadian shareholders.

It was pointed out that the shareholders in that company were not American companies, and not in the whole stock of which is controlled by the American company. In the ordinary course of events this would mean that the surplus assets would go to the American company headquarters or distribution among the whole body of shareholders in that company.

An effort is probable to remove the administration of the affairs of the L. R. Steel Realty Corporation or of the L. R. Steel Merchandising Corporation from the hands of the present trustee, as it is pointed out that at the present time the same trustee is acting in both companies, though the interests involved may be antagonistic.

LOCAL BRANCH CLOSES.
H. E. Wheeler, manager of the London office of the Steel Realty Corporation, yesterday afternoon received word from F. H. Rohr, president of the company, to close the local branch.

"We have listed property to the value of \$750,000 in this city," Mr. Wheeler said, "and although the Steel Company has ceased to function I intend to continue in the real estate business myself in London."

Mr. Wheeler explained that all the Canadian branches of the Steel Realty Corporation were not paying were closed some time ago and that until recently the only ones operating in Ontario were those at Hamilton, Toronto and London.

FIRST ACTION COMMENCES.
Ottawa, March 15.—The first civil action in connection with the failures of the L. R. Steel Company, Limited, and the L. R. Steel Realty Company, was commenced here yesterday when a writ was filed in the county court which brings suit against the L. R. Steel Service Corporation. The action was taken in the name of J. A. Evenden, local manager of the L. R. Steel Service Corporation, which corporation handled the sale of the L. R. Steel stock in Ottawa. A writ was filed for \$514 for services rendered by him to the defendant corporation.

ONIONS WORTH \$49.05
CAUSES COURT ACTION

Judge Ross Decides St. Thomas Merchant Must Pay For 1,635 Pounds.

St. Thomas, March 15.—A case came up at the division court proceedings held before Judge Ross.

The action in the first case was the result of a dispute over the rental of a farm in Elm street belonging to Mrs. J. D. Lamont. Mrs. Lamont claimed that she had rented the farm to George Hite, a former tenant, for \$23 a month for a period of one year, under an agreement by which the lease could be terminated at 30 days' notice. Sixty-six dollars was claimed by the plaintiff and credit given the defendant for about \$29. The defendant counter-claimed for \$50 damages, swearing that he had lost two opportunities to sublet part of the place at \$25 a month, because the plaintiff would not give him possession of the barn.

Judgment was given for the plaintiff to the full amount of the claim, \$36.97 and costs.

A. J. McKenna appeared for the plaintiff and C. B. McClurg for the defendant.

The next case involved some 1,635 pounds of onions at three cents a pound, which Harry Stuard, a local market gardener, claimed. Point Tricoma, fruit dealer in Ross street, had agreed to buy. Judge Ross found for the plaintiff to the amount of claim and costs.

Sam Carson, Yarmouth farmer, was the plaintiff, and Thomas Hitch the defendant in the third suit. The action was the result of a difference of opinion regarding timber land on the farm occupied by the plaintiff and purchased from George Copeland. The plaintiff sued for \$50 and costs, alleging that the defendant had not fulfilled his agreement, and the defendant counter-claimed for \$50 and costs, alleging that he had lost that amount by reason of the plaintiff having refused to let him go on the land and draw out some logs and lumber that had been overlooked.

Judgment was reserved in the case. H. C. Cameron appeared for the plaintiff and C. B. McClurg for the defence.

E. PADDON FACES CHARGE
OF MISAPPROPRIATING \$18

St. Thomas, March 15.—Ernest Paddon, a former fruit merchant of this city, was arrested by Constable Sam McKenna yesterday on a charge of misappropriating funds belonging to Hugh Dailly, fruit dealer.

Mrs. Paddon, who was brought to St. Thomas from Windsor as a witness in a division court case heard by Judge Ross this morning, is alleged to have collected all phases of the grain trade. The resolution reads:

"That, in the opinion of the committee, it is advisable and in the interests of agriculture in this country, that a full and searching inquiry should be made into all aspects of the grain trade of Canada; and that for this purpose a royal commission should be appointed clothed with full powers, not only from the Dominion government but also from all provinces desiring to co-operate in such inquiry."

No Need for Pomp To Dine With King

Labor Leaders Advised They Can Dress At Pleasure.

London, March 15.—The four British Labor leaders, MacDonald, Clynes, Snowden and Thomas, may appear in any sort of costume they desire even overalls, when they dine with King George Thursday night.

The presiding officer of the House of Commons has ruled that Labor members can appear at social functions in any dress they prefer and do not have to wear the silk knee-breeches which are always worn at court functions.

It is believed, however, that the Laborites will wear the breeches in which they appeared at the recent dinner given by Lady Astor.

FAKE CHECK ARTIST
WORKS IN PORT HOPE

Man Who Operated in Woodstock Under Name of Henderson Again Active.

Woodstock, March 15.—The check artist who was at work in Woodstock last week is, according to reports, now operating in other places.

He was spotted in Port Hope by a commercial traveler who happened to see him in Woodstock last week. He signed the name of James Henderson to several checks.

His plan of operation while here was to enter a store and order a large quantity of goods and pay for them by check. He invariably said he would call later for the goods. Soon after he returned and declared that he had ordered too much and asked for a refund. He then disappeared and failed to return for the goods.

At one boot store he asked positions for shoes, and he used a pair of boots, paying for the goods by check, and taking the boots with him, declaring he would return for the rubbers.

That was the last seen of him. Others victimized in Woodstock were a harness dealer and an electrical dealer. In each case the man used the name of James Henderson and said he hailed from Centreville.

JAPAN TO HOLD CHINA
TO ORIGINAL DEMANDS

Tokio Government Declines To Consider Meeting To Discuss Modifications.

Washington, March 15.—Japan intends to hold China strictly to the famous twenty-one demands, which he induced the Chinese government to sign in 1915.

These demands have been regarded as extremely onerous by the Chinese, and the Peking government recently ordered its government to seek abrogation of them. According to Japan, it was asked last week to name a time for a China-Japanese conference at which abrogation or at least modification, could be discussed.

But the Japanese government has handed a reply to the Chinese charge at Tokyo curtly refusing to entertain the suggestion.

The Japanese government is unable to conceal from themselves the sense of surprise and regret at the communication. Under acknowledgment the Japanese reply states "the attempt on the part of your government to abrogate of its own accord treaties and notes which are perfectly valid, will not only fail to contribute to the advancement of friendship between our two countries, but should be accepted as contrary to the accepted principles to international course."
