BUDGET DEBATE CLOSES WITH TORIES VICTORIOUS

Majority For Government Is 47 In Straight Party Vote.

SINCLAIR ATTACKS

Charges Ferguson With Breach of Faith In Stand On O. T. A.

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, March 5.—In the first division of this Legislature on government matters, the Ferguson administration was sustained by a majority of 47. The vote was on the Liberal amendment to the motion to go into supply. The amendment called upon the government to so practice economy that it would balance its budget, and was defeated 70 to 23. The United Farmers voted solidly with the Liberals, and there were no bolters from the Conservative side.

The budget debate was concluded by W. E. N. Sinclair, Liberal leader, and W. H. Price, provincial secretary, although Premier Ferguson said a few words just before the vote was taken. The premier stated that no matter how "nice" the amendment looked, a vote in its favor must be regarded as a vote of no-confidence in the government, and if it carried the government would have no alternative but to resign.

Mr. Sinclair said he could not quarrel with the financial standing of the province as outlined in the budget address, but he criticized the government for not following up its loud declarations for economy with any specific suggestions for that purpose. Indications, he said, were that the government was going heavily into greater expenditure instead of reducing.

Wants Fog Cleared.

He declared the indictment against the old government had not been answered by the U. F. O. speakers. If there had been losses on loans made because of inefficiency or worse, it was the duty of the present administration to find out the truth, so that any suspicion which may have been engendered could be either confirmed or wiped out.

The Liberal leader opposed any bulking of public accounts. "Bulking the various items will simply give an opportunity to cover up petty expenditures, and it is petty expenditures that are the most dangerous. It is also petty expenditures that make great totals," he said.

The Liberal leader pointed to the item whereby Premier Drury had drawn his full \$12,000 salary during the last year after having drawn only \$9,000 for the other years. He thought also that travelling expenses for the cabinet ministers might well be reduced. Last year there had been \$5,500 expenses for U. F. O. ministers and \$7,000 for Conservatives.

Need Reductions.

There were announcements of more and increased expenditures instead of reductions. "The government must cut and cut quickly or the deficit next year will be as great as this year. There is no change of heart indicated in the present government over the last, despite their loud protestation. If there is no improvement, a Liberal government is the only hope for the province."

Mr. Sinclair thought the province should take the total cost of the provincial highway to relieve the counties and townships of the tremendous burden of taxation they were carrying.

Stating the attitude of the Liberal party in the House on the liquor question and the proposed vote, Mr. Sinclair said:

"There has been considerable discussion of the O. T. A. What is the situation? Is it a law passed by this legislature, confirmed by referendum of 1919, with an implied understanding that only a referendum would repeal it? The premier's speeches indicate this. There is now a bill before the House, vague and indefinite in its terms. The premier's interview in Monday's papers indicates there is to be a plebiscite and that legislation will follow the vote if a change is desired. The O. T. A. will be in force until after next session. The Liberal policy is to enforce the law as expressed by the referendum."

Some Protest Vote.

Do the people want a vote now? There are many who do. But protests against a vote are recorded daily in the press and resolutions against a new vote are coming daily to members of this House. The O. T. A. may have its defects and may be hard to enforce. But the responsibility for a vote rests with the government. It refuses to submit the law to the judgment of the people. It proposes an academic vote. This is a direct breach of faith with the people. If there is no vote, it is on the report of the act and a suggestion of what shall take its place."

Mr. Price said the net result of the year's operations had been to add fifteen million to the provincial debt and add an interest charge to Ontario for the next 20 years of \$800,000 a year.

Regarding the criticism he had given no declaration of detail policy as to the future. Mr. Price said that part of his address most misading to the people was when he announced there would be no new taxation. The public was satisfied with the government attempting to get along with the money which was collected from present taxation. As for failing to bring down the probable expenses and revenue of each department the treasurer would make such estimates.

Mr. Price announced that the government had decided to cut down on the main estimates, including grants to various institutions and associations. There would also be more careful consideration to university grants. "If any branch of education is to suffer then would it not be wise for us to call a halt on higher education until we can balance the budget?" he asked.

Charges Partisanship.

To combat the argument that the Drury government was free from partisanship in its money expenditures, Price said the former minister of mines, Mr. Mills, had ten bridges built in his riding of Port

who moved the address in reply to the speech from the throne in Dominion Senate.

William, while Port Arthur, represented by a Conservative, got none. Mr. Price drew attention to what he called a "most outstanding and glaring sand-bagging of the province" in the trading in succession duty free bonds. He knew of an estate in which \$20,000 of Ontario bonds was left by the death of the owner. The trust company who were executors advised selling the bonds at 95, stating that the government at the time would not pay more. "Upon investigation I found that these bonds were sold by the trust company to the Provincial Securities Company, which within a few days turned them over to the government at par," said Mr. Price. Mr. Price said he had been unable to find any address of the Provincial Securities Company or the names of the men forming it. Most of the checks from the government to them were delivered to personal representatives at the Parliament Buildings.

Mr. Price said that this session he would ask approval of the House for loans up to from \$35,000,000 to \$40,000,000. He said that because of the deficit the interest charges alone this year would be \$16,000,000 as against \$14,000,000 last year. He hoped that in the further supplementary estimates there would be a large decrease.

NO DEVELOPMENTS TO CAUSE ALARM

Smallpox Situation Believed To Be Under Control At Windsor.

Windsor, March 5.—There were no developments in the smallpox situation today, and while health officials decline to commit themselves on the question, there is a general impression that the worst is over. This does not mean that no further cases are to be expected, but rather that such will have been provided for.

Dr. Fred Adams, health officer for the Border, emphasized the need, however, for a general vaccination.

The diphtheria situation, too, showed improvement, although some of the cases under observation are regarded as most serious.

FOREST TO ELECT FIGHTING COUNCIL

New Councillors Will All Be Anti-Waterworks Candidates.

Forest, March 5.—Marking the close of a day of constant waterworks discussion the town council held a special and final meeting this evening, with all members present, to receive the resignations of the mayor and three councillors.

The resignations were called by the clerk upon advice of the town solicitor. The resignations were accepted unanimously.

It was rumored today that Reeve Hair and Councillors Cope and Duncan were also resigning, but they are sticking with the waterlogged ship of state. It is now reported that the resignations will not stand for office at the new election, but that an entirely new slate of anti-waterworks candidates will appear.
