HON. F. P. CARVELL PASSES SUDDENLY

Outstanding Canadian. Sup-
porter of Laurier. Dies at
Woodstock, N. B.

INSPECTING FIELDS

Canadian Press Despatch.
St. John, N.B., Aug. 10.—Hon. F.
P. Carvell, chairman of the board of
railway commissioners of Canada, was
suddenly stricken at his home in
Woodstock on Saturday evening and
was found dead on his farm shortly
after five o'clock.

He had arrived from Ottawa at
noon and was apparently in the best
of health. He set out to walk through
the fields, telling the members of his
household that he would return at
five o'clock. He did not return
until he was found dead. He was
found lying on his back, his head
resting on a chair, and his arms
outstretched. He was wearing a
dark suit and a white shirt. A
doctor was hastily summoned and
said that the position of the body in-
dicated that he had died almost in-
stantly.

HAD HEART TROUBLE.

Ottawa, Aug. 10.—News has reached
here of the sudden death at
his home in Woodstock, N.B., of Hon.
Frank P. Carvell. Mr. Carvell left
here on Friday and reached his home
Saturday noon.
Mr. Carvell's death apparently was
due to heart failure. He was a man
of great physique and endurance, but
to intimate friends within the last
year or two he had intimated that he
suffered a little from heart trouble.
When he left Ottawa on Friday last,
however, he was apparently in good
health.

The funeral will take place on
Tuesday, Aug. 12, at 10 o'clock, at
St. John's Anglican church. Mr. Carvell
was born in Woodstock, N.B., on
August 14, 1862. He was of
Loyalist descent. His father, A.
Bishop Carvell, was a native of New
Brunswick, and his mother, Mar-
garet Lindsay, of Ulster stock. He
received a public school education,
and then attended Boston University,
graduating from that institution with
the degree of bachelor of laws. He
read law with L. P. Fisher of Wood-
stock, N.B., being called to the bar
of his province in 1890.

The political career of Hon. F. P.
Carvell opened in 1899 when he was
elected a member of the legislature
for the province of New Brunswick.
He retained his seat for but one year,
however, resigning it to contest
Carleton County for the Liberal inter-
ests in the federal election of 1900.
In this election he was defeated,
but four years later he was suc-
cessful and gained the seat which
he was to hold without interruption
for 15 years.

As a member of the federal House
of Commons, Mr. Carvell was noted
for his aggressive tactics and for
his eloquent speeches. The opening of
the war found him a strong supporter
of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, leader of the
Opposition, but Mr. Carvell was un-
able to support his leader on the
great issue. Finally at the invita-
tion of Sir Robert Borden, he entered
the Union government as minister
of public works, in October, 1917,
subsequently being elected for his old
constituency of Victoria-Carleton at
the general election of 1917. Mr.
Carvell at the time he crossed the
floor of the House of Commons, made
it clear that this step was taken for
the period of the war and demobiliza-
tion only. On August 1, 1919, he re-
signed his portfolio, and on the same
day was appointed chief of the board
of railway commissioners, the posi-
tion he held until his death.

Mr. Carvell found his pleasure and
relaxation in the operation of a 400-
acre farm at Woodstock, N.B. This
farm he had stocked with prize-win-
ing Hereford cattle. When opportunity
afforded, he spent week-ends and
holidays on this farm, in which he
was much interested.

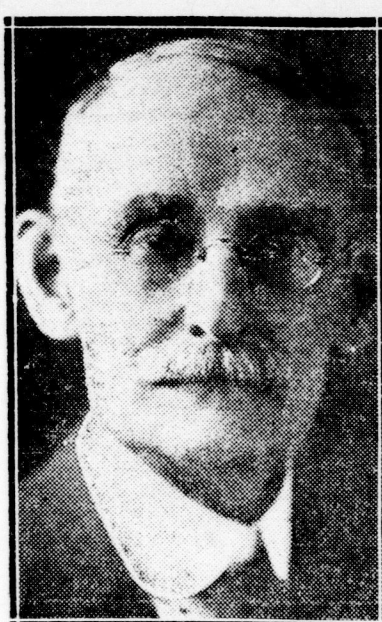
In his early days he was a mem-
ber of the 10th Field Battery of Ar-
tillery, but retired in 1906, retaining
the rank of major. It will be remem-
bered that he was one of Canada's
representatives at the coronation of
King George V. In religion Mr. Carvell
was a Methodist.

Within 18 months there have been
five bereavements in the Carvell
family, including Frank Carvell's
only daughter and two brothers. It
is understood that the only surviv-
ing near relative is his widow. With
the death of Mr. Carvell there passes
one of the few remaining representa-
tives of the old guard of New Brun-
swick public men. His close associa-
tion with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the
prominent part which he played dur-
ing the period when the Liberal
chief was in opposition, and finally
the stand which he took on the
conscription issue, marked him as
one of the outstanding statesmen of
his time.

held a seat for fifteen years, first as
a supporter of the Laurier Govern-

position under Sir Wilfrid Laurier
and later as minister of public works
in the Union Government of Sir

reputation of being a hard fighter,
but one open and above board.

"Fighting Frank" was the name by
which many of his political friends
and enemies knew him, and his
qualities as a debater and adminis-
trator were recognized and respected.

Mr. Carvell was born at Bloom-
field, Carleton County, New Brun-
swick, on August 14, 1862. He was of

THREE BANDITS GET SEVERE SENTENCES

Two Canadians Must Serve
Term in Jackson State
Prison.

Detroit, Aug. 10.—Three youthful
bandits were sentenced late Saturday
by Judge John Faust for holding up
David Lever at his near beer saloon,
East Larned and Randolph, on the
evening of July 23 last, and taking
from the cash register \$400. Two of
those sentenced to Jackson State
prison were Canadians, one Austin
Chater, 3409 Hart avenue, age 27, a
native of Guelph, and whose mother
lives in Toronto and whom Mrs. E.
Pacey at the Hart avenue address is
anxious to get in touch with, and
Fred Legarie, aged 24, of Hull, Que.,
who was sentenced to five years, as
he squeezed on the others who were
arrested at their homes.
The other bandit, Stanley Rogal-
ski, age 22, of 1522 East Jefferson
avenue, came and had fallen. He got
twenty years. Patrolman Howard
O'Brien captured Legarie after he
had shot him in the leg when fleeing.
Chater served in the 53rd battalion
of London.

HALIFAX UNVEILS NAVY MEMORIAL

"Cross of Sacrifice" Erected
Recently by War Graves
Commission.

Halifax, N.S., Aug. 10.—Represent-
atives of the British navy, American
War Mothers and Canadian federal
and provincial governments, as well
as scores of Canadian societies, par-
ticipated today in the unveiling of
"The Cross of Sacrifice," erected re-
cently by the Imperial War Graves
Commission on the foreland of Point
Pleasant Park at the entrance to the
northwest arm.
Vice-Admiral Sir F. L. Field, com-
mander of the British special ser-
vice squadron, the Hood, Repulse
and Adelaide, now in port here, un-
veiled the cross, which is dedicated to
the memory of those members of the
Royal Canadian navy, Royal Cana-
dian naval volunteer reserves, Cana-
dian expeditionary force and Cana-
dian merchant marine who lost their
lives at sea either by enemy action,
disaster or illness while serving in
the great war.
Hon. E. M. MacDonald, minister
of national defence, gave the chief
address.

WOODSTOCK YOUTH DIES ON RAILWAY CROSSING

John Dickson Killed by C. N.
R. Train At Ingersoll
Road Intersection.

Woodstock, Aug. 10.—John, the six-
year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred
Dickson, 90 Main street, was killed,
between five and six o'clock on Sat-
urday afternoon, when struck by a
C. N. R. train at the Ingersoll road
crossing.

The young lad safely crossed the
track after an eastbound freight train
had passed, but was struck by the
4:40 o'clock passenger train which
was late and travelling on the north
track.

A jury was empanelled at 8 o'clock
on Saturday night by Ralph William,
M.D., of Ingersoll, who acted as cor-
oner in place of Dr. Andrew Mac-
Kay, who is out of the city. Adjourn-
ment was made till Monday evening,
when the train crew will be ques-
tioned regarding the fatality.

The remains of the unfortunate lad
were removed to Paul's undertaking
parlors.

BROTHER COMES TO AID OF ALLEGED MURDERER

Engages Well-Known Lawyer
To Defend William Hea-
ley at Detroit.

age 41 years, came up before Judge
John Faust in Recorder's court Sat-
urday afternoon, and was formally
charged with the brutal murder of
his wife, Alice Healey, formerly

falo, N.Y., last Thursday to attend
the funeral, and he has engaged the
services of a well-known criminal
lawyer to defend his brother. His
sister lives at 33 Fairmont avenue,

He will be tried in October.

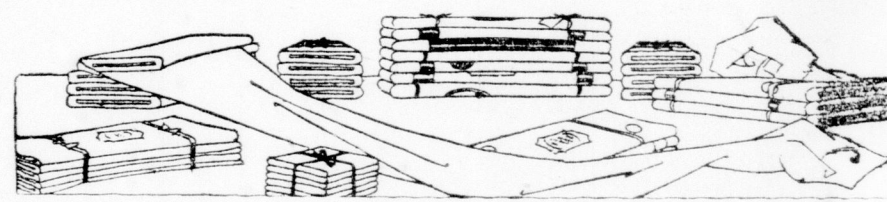
Londoner Hurt By Falling Brick

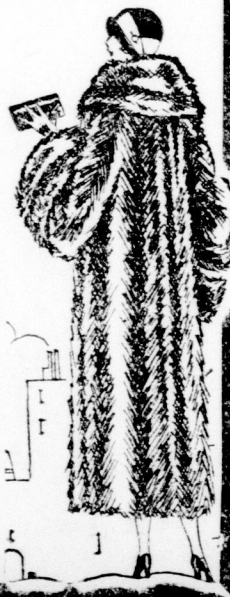
