# CHARLES MATTHEWS, JUN., AGAIN REFUS London Examiners Completed Work On Papers By Aug. 1.

## JUDGE TURNS WN OFFER OF \$150,000

Charles A. Matthews, Jun. Refused Bail by Judge Denton.

STILL HAS HOPE

Application to Supreme Court Will Be Made as Final Resort.

### Special to The Advertiser by a Staff Reporter.

Toronto, Aug. 28.-Charles A. Mat thews Jun., committed for trial on Tuesday by Magistrate Jones in the police court on charges of having violated the secret commission act. conspiracy and fraud, was refused bail by Judge Denton in the county court today, when the defendant was arraigned. He pleaded not guilty and

elected to be tried by jury.

His counsel, Messrs. J. Seymour Corley, K.C., and Hal Gordon, made a strong appeal to allow Matthews bail, offering to supply cash to the amount of \$100,000 or cash and prop-erty to the amount of \$159,000, but Judge Denton, in refusing the application, pointed out that as the fraud cation, pointed out that as the fraud charge under section 160 would have to be tried in the assizes, it would be more fitting if the issue of bail were decided by a supreme court judge.

Matthews had been inspired with the hope that ball would be granted today, but was not unduly cast down and left the court hoping that the application to the higher court would uccessful


