

PROOF LINE ROAD ACTIONS URGED

Recommendation of Broughdale Residents Is Sent to Hon. G. S. Henry.

On the recommendation of residents of Broughdale and deputy minister of public works, Squires, at a meeting in the Tecumseh house last night, it was decided to send a letter to the minister of public works, Hon. G. S. Henry, who was unable to attend the meeting on account of illness, asking that a 14-foot strip of pavement be laid on the west side of the Proof Line road this fall, and that the east side be repaired so that traffic would be able to use the road. Reeve Hodgins of Broughdale stated that at the present time the street railway company could not undertake the work of laying the street car tracks in the middle of the road because of the financial outlay required. The officials of the company state that the proving of the tracks is a dead issue with them until 1925, when the franchise expires, and they will do nothing on the problem until April 1.

The cost of laying new tracks in the middle of the street would be \$37,000, according to the railway officials, and they could not make this outlay at the present time. They want it to be known that they do not oppose the changing of the position of the tracks, but that it is purely financial reason that keeps them from changing the tracks this year.

No engineers of the public highways department were at the meeting, and the problem of grading could not be discussed. Mr. Squires will put this matter before them and a decision as to the grading will be made shortly.

It was first decided at the meeting to send a letter to the minister of public highways, asking that no paving be done on the Proof Line road this year, but this decision was later changed to the one mentioned in the beginning.

INQUEST POSTPONED INTO DEATH OF CHILD

Crown Attorney Busy With Work at the Fall Assizes.

At the request of the crown attorney, who is busy this week with the supreme court sittings, the coroner's inquest into the death of 2-year-old Kathleen Laughey was adjourned for a week. The little girl, the daughter of Frank and Mrs. Laughey of 333 Simcoe street, was struck by a car driven by Mrs. M. B. Fenton on Wednesday morning last while playing on Waterloo street.

She was taken to Victoria hospital, where later she died. J. Cameron Wilson, M.D., as coroner, stated that the inquest would be held on the evening of Tuesday, Oct. 21, at 8 o'clock. Witnesses and jury were asked to be present at that time.

LONDON BOY HONORED BY AMERICAN SOCIETY

Honor for a London boy, Professor Robert W. Angus, of the department of mechanical engineering at the University of Toronto, has come with his election to vice-president of the American society of mechanical engineers. With a membership of over 15,000, the society is the largest engineering organization in the world and has prominent scientists and engineers enrolled from all parts of the universe.

Professor Angus received his primary education in London schools. He is the first Canadian to receive high honors in the A. S. of M. E., and has been the recipient during the past few days of congratulations from Londoners who know him. Prof. Angus was mainly responsible for the founding of the Toronto branch of the society, which now boasts a membership of over 140 engineers.

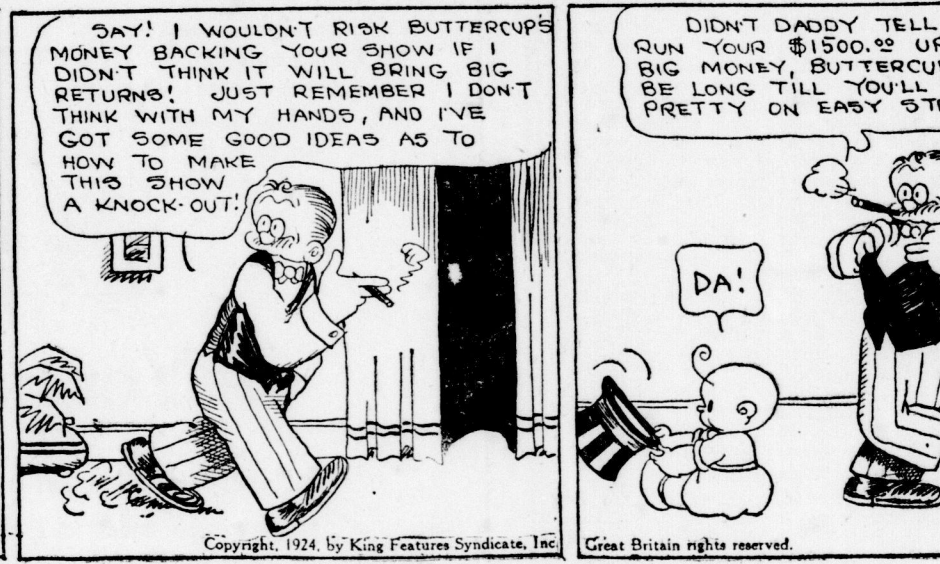

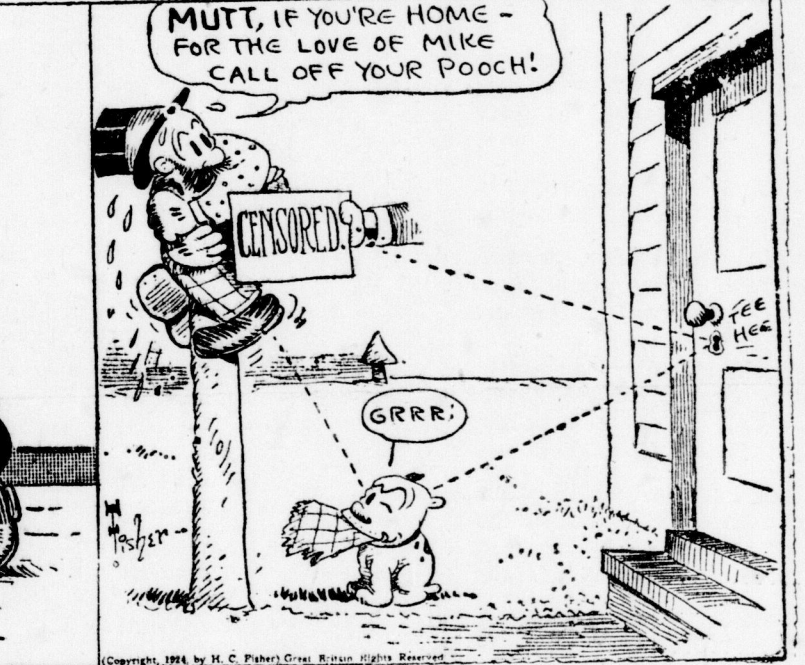

GAS PRICE AT TORONTO MAY TAKE BIG DROP

Auto Fuel Goes Down Four Cents When City Starts Negotiations.

Toronto, Oct. 14.—A further drop in the price of gasoline was forecast today, as the result of a conference with representatives of the mid-continent refineries of Oklahoma, held with Mayor Hiltz at the city hall.

The American representatives, whose organization includes 95 oil producing companies, offered to lay the highest grade of gasoline down in Toronto at a wholesale price of 20½ cents, which would mean 24 cents retail, and other grades at a rate which would mean a retail price of 22½ cents.

Mayor Hiltz promised that their offer would receive very serious consideration. Since Mayor Hiltz suggested the possibility of the city sending gasoline in order to break the high prices, there has been a drop of four cents in the retail market.

**LARGE BARN DESTROYED

"Keep away from the K. K. K. signals if you do not want to come to harm," stated the letter. Immediately following receipt of the letter, Alderman Sherring communicated with the authorities.

Today Corporal Webster of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police arrived on the scene and commenced investigation. The police point out that the receipt of the letter, following the exhibition of the fiery cross a few days ago, leaves little doubt but that the Klan has taken root in Canada.
