The situation surprises even some American newspapers, and the Chicago Journal of Commerce expresses the following opinion which one must admire for its fairness and common

"Britain may yield, but it would seem to be a forlorn hope. If ever the British needed every cent of tax money they could collect, if ever they needed every whit of industrial prosperity that could be induced, that time is now. It would seem to be asking too much to expect them to yield some of their advantage in rubber when we know the state of textiles, mining, steel and every other important British industry.

The United States Rubber Company and other important American companies have solved the problem by operating rubber plantations of their own, free from British control. Smaller companies cannot take such an advantage; yet their claim for consideration seems valid. Why not, then, concede to Britain the right to control her rubber and the desperation which makes her take every possible shilling out Why not put a little more initiative and capital into the development of a source of rubber supply under the American flag?"


