BOLD HOLD-UP OF MAIL TRAIN

Two Masked Men Climbed
on Express and Took Pos-
session of Engine.

MADE TRAINMEN HELP

BONAVENTURE, Col. Apr. 18.—The China-
Japan mail, which left San Francisco
over the Southern Pacific railroad
for the east at 9 o'clock Saturday
night, was held up by two masked
men at 3 p.m., two miles east of here,
early today and robbed of two pouches
of mail.

The passengers on the train were
not disturbed and some of them did
not learn of the robbery until morn-
ing. After getting the mail sacks, the
robbers cut the engine loose from the
train and sent it wild, throttle open
down the main track to the east.

In the direct path of the engine was
a section of passenger train No. 5,
westbound, heavily loaded. But for
the presence of mind of a telegraph
operator at Shuben, a collision would
have taken place. The engine was
thrown into the nick of time.

The train carried no express mat-
ter. Four of the pouches have been
recovered, but the robbers raided the
others and are now hiding in the hills
between Martin and Oakland. Sher-
iff's posse from two counties, detec-
tives and post office inspectors on
horses and in automobiles are engaged
in the man hunt. The robbers were
well armed and a battle is anticipated.

The robbery is the first in California
for several years. It was planned and
executed in sensational fashion.
Before the fast mail arrived at Bon-
avente, two men who had left Oakland
on another train two hours earlier
and had left their train on the Port
Costa Ferry, climbed, unobserved, on
the rear of the fast mail's locomotive.
The train had only gone a short dis-
tance from Bonavente when the stow-
aways crawled over the oil tank of the
tender and pointing revolvers at the
engineer and firemen, ordered them to
stop the engine and get off.

The engineer and firemen quickly
complied. Then the robbers com-
pelled the engineer and firemen to get
into the mail car, which was in charge
of Herbert J. Black and Thomas A.
Clancy.

They cut the registered mail pouch-
es; the robbers ordered
Black started to cut the news-
paper sacks, but the robbers detected
the ruse at once. They threatened to
kill the clerk unless he gave them the
registered mail. Black coughed. The
engineer then was forced to carry
the nine sacks to the engine. The en-
gine and mail car were uncoupled from
the coaches and ran down the track
two miles. Here the mail pouches
were thrown out, the engine was un-
coupled and its throttle pushed wide
open. The engine dashed wild west-
ward toward Tolana, sixteen miles
east, passing the first section on a
sliding at Cygnus.

As the engine passed the station
at Shuben, the operator noticed it
running wild. He immediately re-
sponded to the dispatchers' office at
Oakland and receiving instructions to
call Tolana and instruct them to de-
rail the on-coming engine. The en-
gine was derailed by the Tolana
second section of the west bound train
and just arrived at Tolana under or-
der and in a few happy words thank-
ed the council for the honor they had
shown him.

A vote of thanks was then tendered
to Mayor F. X. Chapados, the out-
going warden for his past services as
such upon the motion of Mayor Le-
gall, seconded by Mayor Darche, se-
conded by Mayor Clement, and ac-
cepted by Mayor Darche. The Council
then took into consideration the for-
warding of the County Council Sec-
retary Treasurer, and accepted the
same upon the resolution of Mayor
Doherty, seconded by Mayor Perland
upon the following conditions: That
the books of the Council should be
audited by him, that all the funds,
archives, books, documents, letters,
etc., belonging to the County Council
should be by him remitted to the
Secretary Treasurer to be appointed
in his stead by the Council, the whole
within thirty days from date.

Mr. George M. Kempfer of New
Carleton, was then appointed secre-
tary treasurer of the County Council,
upon the motion of Mayor Clement
seconded by Mayor Darche, and ac-
cepted by Mayor Doherty. The follow-
ing resolution was then passed:—
Resolved, That the salary of the
secretary treasurer shall be provided for
by him when necessary; the said salary
to run from date; the said secre-
tary treasurer shall be present at the
outgoing secretary treasurer's audit
of the books of the council and is au-
thorized to receive from him all and
every the archives, books, documents,

Meeting Held at New Car-
listle in March of Great
Interest.

THE MINUTES

A grand meeting of the County
Council of the County of Bonavente,
was held at New Carlistle on the
18th of March, at the town hall. At-
tending a full complement of the Mayors
of the different municipalities of the
county attended. There were present
Messrs. John Clement, Mayor of
Paspebiac; T. R. Busted, Mayor of
Cross Point; W. McPherson, Mayor
of Port Daniel West; Albert Dugan,
Mayor of St. Albans; David Darche,
Mayor of Port Daniel East; Dr. H. J.
Martin, Mayor of Carleton; John S.
Mill, Mayor of Maria; P. Landry,
Mayor of Nouvelle; Jos. Doherty,
Mayor of Escomine; N. Arsenau,
Mayor of Carleton West; J. P. Poirer,
Mayor of New Richmond; F. X. Chapados,
Mayor of Gascou; Ernest Allard, Mayor of St.
Oner; Jos. Arsenau, Mayor of St.
Alexis; R. N. LeBlanc, Mayor of St.
Bonaventure; N. Garant, Mayor of St.
Charles de Ouelan; Philippe Perland,
Mayor of Restigouche; E. W. Le Gall,
Mayor of Hope, the whole forming
a quorum under the provisions of
the Municipal Code of the Province
of Quebec.

The Council assembled at ten a. m.
and upon being called to order by
the warden, F. X. Chapados, Mayor
of Gascou, the following resolution
was proposed by Mayor Garant, se-
conded by Mayor Darche, That, in
view of the unavoidable absence of
Messrs. J. P. Lebel, the Sec-
retary Treasurer of the County Council,
and in a few happy words thank-
ed the council for the honor they had
shown him.

LOCAL OPTION WINS IN EVERY WARD

Campbellton Goes Dry by Large Majority in Every
Ward in Town—Temperance People
Jubilant.

VOTE ONLY MEDIUM

The campaign in the interests of
local option closed with a monster de-
monstration in the Opera House last
night, and enthusiasm ran high. De-
spite the downpour of rain a very large
audience, principally voters, was pre-
sent to hear the able addresses deliv-
ered by Rev. W. R. Robinson of St.
John and local speakers. After the
meeting the committees met and de-
cided on the work for the election.

The conditions for turning out a
large number of voters were anything
but good. It rained all day and the
rain was cold and very disagreeable.
While Washington is worrying some
about the determination of Quebec
province to stop the export of pulp-
wood from crown lands, the pulp mills
of Quebec are preparing to increase
their output.

The petition for the Division of
Horse-drawn Carriages, was laid
over for further consideration,
until the next meeting upon the mo-
tion of Mayor LeGall, seconded by
Mayor Darche.

Mayor John Clement was elected
pro-warden unanimously, upon the re-
solution of Mayor McPherson, se-
conded by Mayor R. N. LeBlanc.
Mayor Clement then moved, seconded
by Mayor McPherson, that a vote
of condolence and a message of sym-
pathy be sent by the Council, through
the Secretary Treasurer, to Mrs. Wm.
T. Smith, and the members of the
family, upon the death of Captain W.
T. Smith, late auditor of this coun-
cil.—Carried.

The secretary treasurer was in-
structed to give the proper notice
to the secretaries of Maria and Car-
leton, regarding the change in the
vision lines of said municipalities, af-
ter hearing advocate J. H. Kelly.
Upon the motion of Dr. Martin, se-
conded by Mayor N. Arsenau, the
amount of \$247.42 was ordered to be
assessed in the dual way for the
current expenses of the County Council.
It was proposed by Mayor Doherty
seconded by Mayor Fallow, that all
arrearages due the different Mayors for
expenses in attending the County
Council be forthwith paid, and that
the warden and secretary treasurer
be authorized without further delay
to obtain the necessary funds so to
do, from La Banque Nationale at New
Carleton. Carried.

Mayors McPherson and Fallow were
unanimously appointed delegates for
County purposes upon the motion of
Mayor Clement, seconded by Mayor
N. Arsenau.
Questions of roads were then taken
into consideration, upon the subject
being brought up by Mayor Doherty.
The following resolution was then
passed:—Resolved, That the bridge
dividing the municipalities of St.
Alexis and St. Ann's of Restigouche,
be declared a County Bridge, and that
the costs of the repairs and main-
tenance of the same be at the charge
of the said municipalities interest-
ing according to their respective
valuation rolls, and that a copy of
this resolution be forwarded to the
said municipalities. Carried.

The adjournment during the din-
ner hour was proposed by Mayor Le-
gall, seconded by Mayor Darche.
Carried.
At two o'clock in the afternoon
the council further proceeded with
the orders of the day.
Advocate Thomas A. Blanchet was
heard regarding the request of the
inhabitants of the Millbrook and sur-
rounding territory to be attached to
Matapedia and same was laid over
for consideration until the next meet-
ing of the Council, upon the presen-
tation of a petition in due form, upon
the motion of Mayor LeBlanc, se-
conded by Mayor Clement.
A general discussion took place upon
the affairs of the Council and all
business having been done a vote of
thanks was carried by the Council to
Mr. J. Edward Smith, secretary,
pro. temp. for his services, upon the
motion of Mayor Chapados, seconded
by Mayor Garant.

The Council then adjourned upon
the motion of Mayor LeGall, se-
conded by Mayor Darche.

NEW BILLS WANTED

OTTAWA, Apr. 18.—In the House of
Commons the other day Mr. E. N. La-
cas asked the Government what steps
it was taking to secure the use of a
clean currency in Canada. He pointed
out that many dirty bills were in cir-
culation, instead of being replaced by
clean ones from the bank. He noted
that an analysis made by Dr. Pype of
Toronto, of a dollar bill showed that
2,952,280 microbes were scattered over
its surface. He asked if there was
any government standard in the mat-
ter of clean bills, and if the Gov-
ernment had enough coin and two dol-
lar bills on hand to replace the sup-
ply of dirty bills.

In the absence of the Minister of
Finance, Mr. Wilfrid regretted that
he could not give any detailed answer
to the questions. He pointed out that
the Government had introduced a
budget this year which would con-
tinue a good deal of clean money.
Mr. Bickerdike—If there were all
these microbes on a one-dollar bill
think how many there must be on a
fifty-dollar bill.

ROOT NOW FAVORS TRADE WITH CANADA

Thus Sentiment in
of Reciprocity
With Dominion

TO INCLUDE MEXICO

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Senator
Root of New York, a hearty con-
fident that reciprocity with Canada is one
of the important subjects coming up for
future consideration, and he talked
on the question after having the white
house, yesterday. Mr. Root believed
that reciprocity negotiations gradually
will take time but thinks that some
agreement can be reached. He said
after talking to President Taft.

"I should think that progress in a
matter of that kind would be slow, al-
though there is a tremendous senti-
ment all along the border of the two
countries for reciprocity in natu-
ral products. The time is just for re-
ciprocity in manufacturing products, that
is, the time for a policy of protec-
tion for her manufactured products
and would not want reciprocity along
this line. But there unquestionably
is deep interest among several millions
of people of both countries in bring-
ing about a mutually satisfactory un-
derstanding regarding reciprocity in
natural products."

Naturally it is felt that Mr. Root's
remarks are important as bearing on
the temper of the senate as the sen-
ate will need the support of that
body in getting any reciprocity treaty
ratified.

It is noticeable that sentiment in
Congress is growing in favor of re-
ciprocity with Canada. There like-
wise is a sentiment in favor of ex-
tending the same courtesy to Mexico,
so that the negotiations will be based
on 'contiguous territory' and it is
believed, on this basis can withstand
criticism of foreign countries who may
complain that Canada is getting bet-
ter rates than they are getting.

Tariff builders who were intensely
connected with the Payne-Aldrich act
are not seriously disturbed at the pro-
posed action of the Province of Que-
bec looking to prohibiting the export-
ation of wood pulp to the U. S.

While they would much prefer that
the present trade relations should con-
tinue they point to the language of the
tariff act as looking to a possible ex-
tension of this character and say that
the United States is protected.

It was stated that a bill of the sen-
ate today that the language of the provi-
sion was from the pen of Representative
Minn of Illinois, chairman of the
special committee on paper and pulp,
but the figures were arranged in the
conference on the tariff bill. This is
the provision.
