THE WOOLLEN INDUSTRY

Its Expansion Desirable in the Interests of the Whole Country

It is significant to note that the sheep industry has dwindled rapidly since the introduction of the British preference which has resulted in closing a large number of woolen mills in different parts of the country. A partial solution would be to revise the tariff on woolen goods.

Dealing with the sheep industry, the Globe, Toronto, in a recent issue said: "Expansion of the woolen industry and sheep-raising industry in Canada is desirable in the interests of the whole country. There is a sure and constant market for wool, because there is nothing to adequately take its place. To every nation that has taken the industry seriously it has proved highly profitable, one of the best paying for the amount of work involved. Canada has natural conditions adapted to the raising of the finest mutton and wool, as the meagre attempts of our pioneers have proved, and we have proved, and we have plenty of waste land. As products of sheep there are not only wool and mutton but tallow as well."

Very Low in Canada Compared With the United States Duty

In view of the charge not infrequently made that the cotton tariff of Canada represents high protection, one may well ask what degree of protection the tariff of the United States on textiles represents. The truth is that the Canadian duty on textiles is little more than a revenue tariff. Here is a comparison:

The average duty on grey cottons entering the United States from foreign markets, is 40%, whilst the duty on these goods entering Canada is only 16%. About 60% of our whole output is composed of grey cottons, on which the duty is 16%.

Reheated cottons enter the United States at a duty of about 60%. The same goods enter into Canada at 17%. About 20% of our output is this class of goods.

Printed cotton goods enter the United States at a duty of about 52%. These same goods enter Canada at a duty of 24%. These form about 10% of our output.

STEEL INDUSTRY IS HAMPERED

If Iron and Steel Plants are to Extend Present Schedules Must be Overhauled

It is generally recognized that iron and steel are the basic industries of Canada. Think for a moment of the great variety of articles into whose manufacture iron or steel enters. The following despatch, therefore, to the Globe, from Sault Ste. Marie giving a statement of T. J. Drummond of the Lake Superior Corporation is of interest:

"In regard to further extensions, I may say that we have had under consideration certain extensions of our iron and steel plant, but we have decided to postpone such action in the meantime, pending possible consideration and action of the Dominion Government in regard to the iron and steel tariff.

"The existing tariff in iron and steel is so torn up by special dispensations, exemptions and rebates, that the progress of the industry is retarded, and in many cases made absolutely impossible. Under the existing tariff we are encouraged to manufacture in small lines, giving small tonnages, and then discouraged in progression into the manufacture of heavier sections, which give larger tonnages. In other cases industries are practically bonused to purchase their pig iron, merchant steel, etc., abroad, and so in one way and another the industry is hampered, and the tariff is in many cases by these exemptions made absolutely illogical and inconsistent.

"If the iron and steel industry is to go forward this tariff must be overhauled, and such matters as I have referred to must be dealt with in a common sense manner, and especially in connection with pig iron, merchant mill products and structural steel. At present practically one million tons of iron and steel are annually being brought into the country, and the bulk of this tonnage could and should be made in Canada. We placed our case before the Government during the last session of Parliament, and we are hoping that something may be done this session, but pending the outcome of what consideration the Government is giving to our case, we can only mark time, and hope that such action will be taken as will warrant us in going ahead with the extensions we have in view."

INDIANS NOW WORK

Scarcity of Game and Fur Animals Brought About the Change

That the day is coming to an end when the red man will live as fisherman, hunter and trapper is declared in a report of the Indian Department issued at Ottawa. The growing scarcity of game and fur-bearing animals in many districts is driving many of the hunting tribes into the occupations of the palefaces. The services of Indians are becoming more generally utilized as farm hands and in other industrial pursuits.

The earnings of the red man in agriculture for one year amounted to \$1,464,347, and in wages to \$1,616,046, while at hunting and trapping during the same time they made \$904,857. Canada's Indian population is placed at 104,956, and the Eskimo population is 4,600. The additions to the Province of Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec added 7,619 Indians to the Indian population of these provinces, and reduced the total in the North-West Territories to 5,362. Ontario has more Indians than any other province, a total of 26,393. British Columbia formerly led, but the addition to Ontario brought in 5,337 Indians.
