Opposition Make Insultations
Against Finance Minister.

BUT DO NOT ACCEPT THE CHALLENGE

Charlton's Sunday Bill Read a
Second Time.

Fees of the Grain Inspector at Fort William Alleged to Be Excessive—Government Employees Being Laid Off by Wheatstalker—Judge Fournier's Resignation Denied—Night Increase in the Revenues for April—\$1000 to Assist Farmers—Paradise—Budget Speech to-Morrow.

Ottawa, May 1.—The Budget Speech will be delivered on Friday, so Mr. Foster intimated to your correspondent to-night.

The day's proceedings in the Lower House have been a repetition of what is evidently the settled Opposition policy of maintaining public men on the Ministerial side of the House. Yesterday Mr. Lawrie made an unjustifiable onslaught on Sir Frank Smith. To-day Mr. McMillen, assisted by Messrs. Lester, Mulock and Cartwright, turned their attention to Mr. Foster, because the leader of the House has accepted the Conservative nomination for York County in connection with the Fredericton and St. Mary's Railway bridge, the owners of which owe the Government some \$70,000 on a loan, is situated in that county. An effort was made to hold Mr. Foster responsible for delinquencies on the part of the company in paying its just debt. In this respect the Opposition woefully failed, as Mr. Foster, in reply, pointed out the fact in argument they made up by bitterness of invective. So far as the bridge has been any hoodluming in connection with the bridge, as the Opposition alleged, the bridge company has paid \$90,000 of its own money locked up in the work, which would have been a good paying investment had the Canadian Pacific short line from Harvey to Salisbury been built. The underlying motive of the attack was the discredit Alexander Coombes, the former king of New Brunswick, who was formerly a Liberal, but is now a pro-Liberal Conservative.

In the House

At opening of House a large number of the bills were introduced, among them the following: To incorporate the Bankers' Life Association, Mr. Denison; to incorporate the Canadian United Bankers' Society, Mr. Moncrieff; respecting Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway Tunnel Co., Mr. Ingram; Mr. McMillen introduced his bill for the removal of Lieutenant-Governors.

Mr. Foster, replying to Sir Frank Smith, Cartwright, said, and Mr. Lester, April announced to \$2,896,500 as compared with \$2,442,637 in April, 1894. The expenditure last month was \$2,835,000 as compared with \$2,183,624 in April, 1894.

Mr. Costigan informed Sir Richard that the expenses of the Behring Sea arbitration totaled \$135,000. He incorporated \$5,000 paid as counsel fees in the W. P. Hayward case, which was appealed to the Supreme Court. The United States had paid \$100,000.

No Arrangement With General Booth.

Col. O'Brien asked if any correspondence or other communication had taken place between General Booth of the Salvation Army and the Government with reference to the establishment of a settlement in any part of the Dominion. \$1000 for Paradise Reclamation Scheme.

Mr. Daly, replying to Mr. Devlin, said that \$1000 had been granted by order in council to the Paradise Reclamation Society of Montreal, of which he was president, to be expended in the furtherance of the business scheme of settling emigrants from Michigan to the Nipissing district. No portion of that amount was to be used for transportation. The duty of seeing that the immigrants were properly placed lay with the Dominion Lands and Survey Department, as the Immigration Department Government, as the immigrants landed.

Mr. Montague, replying to Mr. Devlin, said it was the intention to have a survey of Manitoba next year.

Grain Inspection Fees.

Mr. Martin moved for a return, showing the amount for inspection fees on grain at Fort William. He requested William Inspector Gibbs was making about \$18,000 a year out of inspection, while he was receiving no salary for his services as a year by insuring grain, giving him the salary of \$20,000 to \$30,000, and \$300,000 for the samples and fees of farmers. He was informed that the inspector also sold samples of the grain left with him.

Inspector Gibbs said that Mr. Martin was mistaken about Inspector Gibbs' salary. As the Department report showed that he only received last year \$3,000, and that he had to pay for his assistants, he was not disposed to defend excessive receipts from farmers. In fact, he had under consideration a request for a reduction of the fees reached a certain figure, they had been given to the Treasury, and had even been made to the Department. THE PRISONERS' PROCEEDINGS

Unsuccessful Application for Postponement.

AFFIDAVITS THAT DID NOT WORK.

Supplementals To Be Introduced to the Court To-Day.

But as the Additional Affidavits Do Not Meet the Statute Any More Than Did the Arguments Put In Yesterday the Result Will Probably Be Decision That the Case Must Proceed—The Prisoners Are Arraigned and Plead Not Guilty.

The trial of Dallas T. and Harry P. Hyams, charged with having on Jan. 16, 1893, deliberately murdered William Chincock while they commenced on Monday next.

In the cross-examination of Mr. Horn, who claimed that Clara T. Hyams and Mrs. Clara Hyams were material witnesses in the case was abandoned, and it was admitted by Mr. Horn that he only knew from hearsay that Chapman Hyams of New Orleans was suffering from insanity.

In the affidavit filed the name of Sammie Sinter was mentioned as a material witness, but it was learned yesterday that Detective Cuddy remarked that he had seen the man in the court room, and he immediately went out and 10 minutes returned with the man. When this witness put in an appearance his name was dropped and pleaded no guilty. As the witnesses whom the defence required, submitted supplemental affidavits will be taken up tomorrow morning, and as they do not comply with the requirements of the statute, the defence will undoubtedly order that the trial shall proceed, and the efforts to delay the case to starve off the trial will have failed.

The two prisoners were arraigned yesterday and pleaded no guilty. They looked as if their enforced imprisonment agreed with them, Dallas T., who has been called "the whitey," looking better than Harry, who is charged with the crime according to the evidence, who, the Crown contends, is the principal offender, appearing particularly chipper.
