Principal Taylor, of Queen's Warns of "Vagrant Impulses"

SPEAKS AT ST. ANDREW'S

Special Services Mark Anniversary of Church

Whether one does the right thing or the wrong thing when a temptation or crisis arises depends on the habitual train of thought, according to Rev. Dr. R. Bruce Taylor, principal of Queen's University, speaking at the 87th anniversary at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church last night. The speaker took as his text the reply of Aaron to Moses when he was upbraided for the raising of the golden calf as a god to the Israelites. "I cast it into the fire and there came out this calf."

The University president declared that the ignoring of responsibility was due to the habitual train of thought into which the inactive mind was allowed to run year after year. When a person fell into temptation it was usual for the person to ignore the responsibility by saying that the strain was so great that it would have broken any resolution, but that alone was responsible. It was the habitual trend of the thought that brought these things upon one.

NEED DEFINITE POLICY
What was needed in any position of responsibility was some definite policy, according to the speaker. In the Government as in a private enterprise a definite, not a hither and thither, policy was necessary. Some one was

PRINCESS PATS' FAREWELL SERVICE

Large Congregation at Cronyn Memorial Church

WREATH PUT ON ALTAR

In Memory of Men Who Fell at Passchendaele

On the occasion of the farewell service to the P. P. C. L. L., that is soon leaving London for the Canadian West, Cronyn Memorial Church was filled to overflowing yesterday morning. Many people had to be turned away from the church after all available seats had been filled, including extra chairs which were placed in for the service in memory of the comrades who were killed in the battle of Passchendaele three years ago a wreath had been placed on the altar by the men.

Rev. G. Q. Warner, during his address, referred briefly to the men who had given up their lives on the battlefield for their ideals. The eagerness with which the men enlisted showed that they were answering the impulse to defend what they knew to be right.

HARD TO DESCRIBE

Not one out of a thousand would have given that as his reason," said the speaker. "We are all quite unable to describe our impulses."

Continuing the speaker pointed out that the same atmosphere surrounded these men as inspired the writers of the Psalms. There was the same natural longing that right should triumph and a heart desire to bring about freedom.

Referring to the sacrifice made by thousands during the war Mr. Warner urged that all now should be as anxious to live for Canada. The patriotism that will lead one to offer his life for his country should also inspire him to live for it.

"We need a true perspective to-day," he said. "We must not stand with those whom the Bible calls fools, who say there is no God, nor must we side with those who tell us that the day

of the Lord is here and that God has been fully revealed."

SORRY THEY ARE GOING

Expressing regret that the P. P. C. L. L. is removing from London Mr. Warner assured the men that the best wishes of the congregation would go with them. They would, he is sure, uphold the ideals which were followed all through the war and thus help to make Canada a country worth living for, as well as one for which a man would die.

Six officers of the regiment: Lieut.-Col. E. M. Godwin, Major H. W. Niven, Major Clarke, Capt. Isbister, Capt. Edgar and Lieut. McIntosh, took up the offering, and proceeded by Wardsmen Edwin Smith and H. J. Chids, presented it at the altar.

Rev. R. E. Heathcote read the Scripture lessons. The men under the command of Col. R. E. Willes, and led by the band, marched from their quarters to the church via Rattle and Adelaide streets and Queen's avenue. The band assisted in the musical part of the service.

WEATHER FOR OCTOBER

Corresponding Month of Last Year Equaled That of Past Month

Although the past month was ideal fall weather, the corresponding month last year was even better, according to the monthly weather report given out by the local bureau last night. The rainfall last year exceeded that of this year a trifle, but the highest point reached by the thermometer was 85.

The first snow flurries last year did not come until November 5, while a few flurries fell last Friday.

Last month—Rainfall, 4.02 inches; highest temperature, 80 on the 14th; lowest, 29 on the 25th; a few snow flurries on the 29th.

Year ago—Rainfall, 5.38 inches; highest temperature, 85 on the 2nd; lowest, 29 on the 20th. No snow.

KNOX CONGREGATION PLANS NEW CHURCH

Minister at Anniversary Services Points to the Need—Mrs. McHardy-Smith Resigns

At special services marking the anniversary of Knox Presbyterian Church yesterday the minister, Rev. T. A. Symington, announced the retirement of Mrs. McHardy-Smith as organist and choir leader. Mrs. McHardy-Smith would be replaced at once, he stated, but he could not make a definite announcement as to her successor. Mr. Symington paid tribute to the work that had been accomplished in the musical services of the church since Mrs. McHardy-Smith assumed charge a year and a half ago, and conveyed the appreciation of the congregation for the manner in which the choir had been built up.

Knox Church, said Mr. Symington, the only Presbyterian congregation in a section of the city which has a population of 10,000, has a great work ahead of it in the future, and he urged the support of the people in plans which were being considered as the congregation entered its 38th year of activity. One of the first things toward which attention would be directed, he said, would be a new Sabbath school building, and after that a new church edifice. Both were badly needed.

Sermons yesterday at Knox were by Prof. William Manson, D.D., of Knox College and formerly of Glasgow. Musical numbers were in charge of Mrs. McHardy-Smith, presiding at the organ for the last time.

COTTAGES ON HOSPITAL SITE SOLD AT AUCTION

Excavation Work on New Children's Institution to Be Started Shortly

Seven cottages on the site for the new children's hospital, opposite Victoria Hospital, were sold on Saturday at auction and brought \$5,200. This is thought to be a good price for the houses.
