Toronto, April 11.—Receipts at the City Cattle Market were 75 loads, with 1,350 head of cattle, 652 sheep and lambs, 400 hogs and 606 calves.

There was a very good quality of cattle offering, but owing to the fact that local buyers have laid in rather large supplies for the Easter trade, and the absence of buyers for outside points, Montreal excepted, the market turned unexpectedly dull. **Spring Assizes**

The spring assizes for the County of Lambton, will open at Sarnia next Tuesday. There are three criminal cases to come before the court, as follows:—

Rex vs. Hughes.—The defendant, Anthony Hughes, of the Township of Sarnia, is charged with obtaining goods under false pretences from Anthony Parr of the township of Dawn. This case was tried at court of sessions and resulted in a disagreement of the jury. J. R. Logan for deft.

Rex vs. John Trolley.—Charge of attempted arson, defendant being alleged to have offered money to several persons to induce them to set fire to the barns of Neil McLean, livery stable keeper of the village of Alvington. Pardee, Burnham & Gurd for deft.

Rex vs. A. J. Trolley.—Defendant is father of defendant in preceding case, and the charge is the same, defendant having, as is alleged offered money to two different persons to set fire to the McLean barns. Pardee, Burnham & Gurd for deft.

Walter Mills, K. C., of Ridgeway, will represent the crown in each case.

The icehouse of W. A. Brown, between Sarnia and Point Edward, was destroyed by fire Tuesday afternoon. The origin was due to incendiarism or the carelessness of boys with matches, playing near the vicinity. A two-years' crop, stored there, was melted—enough to supply Sarnia all season, and the affair may mean an ice famine there. There was no insurance.

High School Inspector Wetherell's report of his inspection on March 28th and 29th was read.

Dodds—Wynne, that the High School Inspector's report be accepted and filed.—Carried.

Swift—White, that the use of the following text books in form IV, be approved:—"Principles of Botany," Bergen & Davis; "Elements of Chemistry," Jones; "Elementary Zoology," Kellogg; "Hall and Knight's Trigonometry."—Carried.

Communication was read from the Secretary of the Stratford Collegiate Institute Board regarding a new form of agreement for teachers.

Hicks—MacKercher, that the communication be received and filed.—Carried.

Dodds—Wynne, that T. B. Willoughby's account for extra work, \$1.25, be paid.—Carried.

MacKercher—Hicks, that the High School principal be authorized to procure any necessary supplies, particularly an unabridged dictionary.—Carried.

Principal Shrapnell presented his report for the month of March.

Dodds—Wynne, that the report be accepted.—Carried.

The report of Public School Inspector MacDoughall on his inspection of March 30th and 31st was read.

MacKercher—White, that the Inspector's report be received, and that the Principal be authorized to procure the books recommended by the Inspector.—Carried.

Swift—Dodds, that we adjourn.—Carried.
