 May 7th. It says:—

Dear Madam:—I beg to inform you
 that Private R. Acton, Canadian Army
 Service Corps, No. 512908, who is now at
 Grecian Street Hospital, Broughton,
 Manchester, came there on the 28th of
 April suffering from a rather badly
 broken arm and also his wrist had been
 sprained, but we are pleased to tell you
 our report is that Pte. Acton was going
 on quite nicely. He will be visited from
 time to time by our authorized visitor
 who will then write to you and we will
 also supply any extra comforts he may
 desire, such as reading matter, cigarettes,
 shaving kit or anything we can that will
 be of use to him while in Hospital.

Austin Boy Make Supreme Sacrifice

Mr. J. D. Duncan received a telegram
 from the War Office informing him of the
 death of his son, Pte. M. D. Duncan, who
 died of wounds on April 3rd.

"Met," enlisted with the 107th Batt.,
 and trained in Camp Hughes all last sum-
 mer, going to England with his battalion
 last fall to finish training, and in February
 they crossed over to France as a pioneer
 battalion.

He had lived among us from childhood
 and was a general favorite with all with
 whom he came in contact. He was an en-
 thusiastic baseball player, and we know
 he was the kind who would play the
 game at the front as well as on the
 diamond.

The father, mother and family have the
 deepest sympathy of the whole communi-
 ty, but we all have the satisfaction of

knowing he gave up his life for a just
 cause.—"Greater love hath no man than
 this, that a man lay down his life for his
 friends."—John 15:13.

The number that turned out to the
 Memorial Service on Sunday showed
 in what respect our late friend, Pte. M.
 D. Duncan, was held.

The following is a copy of a letter re-
 ceived by Mrs. J. Duncan, from J. E.
 Collier:—

April 4th, 1917.

Dear Mrs. Duncan:

Words fail me to express my sympathy
 and that of all the boys of the 9th platoon
 to you in this time of trial. Poor Melvie's
 smiling face will be missed from amongst
 us, for he had a smile and cheery word
 for you at all times; his noble and manly
 principles had won the esteem of all. No
 one can miss him more than myself, being
 my bed-mate and constant chum for the
 past six months. My heart is too full to
 write more, but it may afford some slight
 consolation to know that he died without
 pain, being killed instantly. Any person-
 al articles that may be found I will see
 that they are forwarded to you.

New Medical Classification for Enlisted Men

Every man who presents himself for
 enlistment in the Canadian forces will
 hereafter be allotted to some unit in
 those forces, his physical condition
 will possibly permit of it, as a result
 of the new medical classification re-
 cently issued by the militia department
 for the use of the medical boards, whose
 duty it is to examine prospective re-
 cruits. Until the 25th and 27th Railway
 Construction Battalions were authorized
 about the end of January last, the phys-
 ical requirements were the same for all
 units of the expeditionary forces, but

at that time the standards were lowered,
 and those two units were allowed to
 take men unfit for service with the
 infantry or other branches of the service.

Shortly after that the Army Medical
 Corps, the Forestry Companies, the
 Army Dental Corps and Pioneer and
 Construction units were allowed simi-
 lar privileges, and since then men, who
 upon examination were found unfit for
 service in the infantry, have been advised
 to join the other branches for which they
 could qualify.

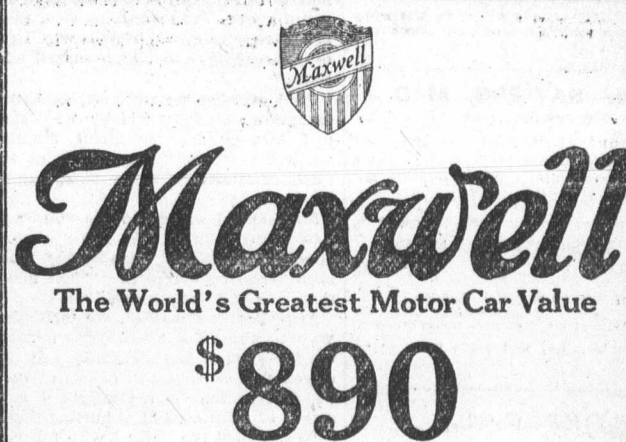
According to the new plan which is
 to go into operation at once, every man
 who is examined, must now be classified,
 and then sent to the branch for which he
 is capable. If a man is not fit for service
 in the combatant forces he may be able
 to pass the tests for the Forestry Con-
 struction units. If unable to measure up
 to those tests he may be able to serve
 in some capacity in Canada, in such units
 as the Special Service Company, the
 Service Company of the Canadian
 Engineers, or the Service Detachment
 of the Army Service Corps Details, the
 idea apparently being to utilize the ser-
 vices of every man in the country who is
 willing to serve, in some capacity, and
 that if a man cannot serve in a combatant
 force he may be placed in some force
 where his services may release another
 man for service in a combatant force.

Induction at Wyoming and Plympton

At Wyoming Wednesday of last week
 Rev. John P. McLeod, of the Presbytery
 of Kingston, was ordained to the Presby-
 terian ministry and inducted into the
 pastoral charge of Wyoming and South
 Plympton by the Presbytery of Sarnia.
 There was a large attendance from both
 congregations. The moderator, Rev. J.
 C. Forster, of Watford, presided and the
 addresses were delivered by Rev. R. J.
 Hall, of Sarnia, Rev. R. Simpson, of
 Camlachie, and Rev. J. Wilson, of Man-
 daumia. The Presbytery sustained the
 call from Arkona and West Adelaide to
 Rev. C. B. Ratcliffe, of St. Paul's. A
 resolution was adopted asking the mem-
 bers of parliament representing the
 districts of Lambton and Middlesex to
 the Presbytery of Sarnia to support
 Dominion-wide prohibition when such is
 introduced at the present session. The
 Presbytery will meet next at Petrolia on
 May 29th.
