**FOREIGNERS ALL KILLED.**  
Held on in British Legation Till  
Ammunition Gave Out.  
British Legation Finally Was Burned and  
all the Foreigners, 1,000 in Number,  
Including 400 Soldiers, 100 Members  
of the Chinese Customs Staff and a  
Number of Women and Children Were  
Killed.  
Shanghai, July 4, 5 p. m.—Three  
Chinese servants of foreigners have,  
it is rumored, from a good source,  
escaped from Peking. They report  
that all the foreigners, 1,000 in num-  
ber, including 400 soldiers, 100 mem-  
bers of the Chinese Customs staff and  
a number of women and children,  
held out till their ammunition was  
exhausted in the British Legation.  
The legation was finally burned  
and all the foreigners were killed.  
It is reported that Kwang Hsu and  
the Bowyer Empress have been  
poisoned.

**SUICIDAL TO REACH PEKING.**  
Commanders of the Allies Practically  
Abandon the Legations.  
London, July 5.—(2.30 a.m.)—  
The commanders of the allies for a  
Tien Tsin inform the correspondents that  
it would be suicidal to reach Peking  
with the troops now available, in the  
face of the force of Imperial troops  
and Boxers occupying the country be-  
tween Tien Tsin and Peking. So far  
from taking the offensive, the 12,000  
troops at Tien Tsin and the 8,000  
others at Taku and intermediate  
points can barely keep up communica-  
tion, fighting incessantly with over-  
whelming numbers, using far more  
artillery pieces than the allies.  
This telegram has been received:  
"Shanghai, July 4.—(11.10 a.m.) via  
the Foo-Yi-Tien. Tien Tsin fell be-  
tween 7 and 8 o'clock on the morn-  
ing of June 30."

**BOXERS ARE IN CONTROL.**  
The Imperial Forces Has Entered an  
Altar Where Boxers Bites Are  
Preferred.  
London, July 5.—The Times Shang-  
hai correspondent, telegraphing under  
date of July 3, 10 p. m., says:  
"The following information has been  
communicated to me from a trustworthy  
source. It was brought by a special cor-  
respondent, who left Peking, June 27. He states  
that 15,000 Boxers and Chinese troops at-  
tacked the legations on that day. They  
were repulsed with loss. One gate of the  
Imperial Palace is open daily for a few  
hours. The Emperor and the Empress  
Dowager are there, surrounded by im-  
personal attendants, all Boxers. The Im-  
perial Palace has erected an altar in the  
palace grounds, where the Boxers rit-  
ual is performed.  
"The attack of the allied forces upon the  
city of Tien Tsin began at 8 a.m.  
on July 3. The allies were taken at 2 p.  
m. The main object is the destruction of the  
city fort, from which the foreign settle-  
ments are shelled.  
"I am informed that the total of the Jap-  
anese troops landed is 15,000, and that  
a further force of 20,000 has been mobil-  
ized, and is ready for embarkation."

**THE IMPERIAL DECREE.**  
Dated at Peking, June 25, Calls on People  
to Join the Boxers.  
Shanghai, July 3.—The Imperial  
decree, dated Peking, June 25, has  
been sent by courier to Pao Tsin Fu,  
and thence telegraphed broadcast.  
"The decree calls on the people, Boxers,  
patriots and people, combined  
to join the Boxers to resist the foreign  
invaders. We have already sent im-  
perial orders to the provinces to join the  
Boxers and to exterminate the foreign  
invaders. There must be men of similar patri-  
otism and bravery in all the provinces of the  
empire. We therefore command all vic-  
eroys and governors to join such and or-  
ganize them into troops.  
"The decree also calls on all the magis-  
trates in the empire at the rate of two  
hundred suits per day.  
"The Pao-tsin Fu Legation.  
High Chinese officials here stated  
today that they had received a mes-  
sage from Peking saying that 24 hours  
would decide the fate of the remain-  
ing foreign legations.  
Severe fighting continues around  
the city. Admiral Seymour is re-  
ported to have been wounded in a  
pitched battle."

**A MESSAGE FROM SEYMOUR.**  
Europeans Have Gathered in British Legation.  
London, July 5.—The Admiralty  
has received a despatch from Vice-  
Admiral Seymour, dated Tien Tsin,  
Saturday, June 29. After repeating  
the report from Peking of the destruc-  
tion of all the legations except the  
British, French, German and part of  
the Russian he adds:  
"The Europeans have gathered in  
the British legation. They have pro-  
visions, but the ammunition is scarce.  
One gate of the city near the legation  
is held by the Europeans with guns  
captured from the Chinese. Five  
of the marine guard have been killed  
and an officer wounded.  
"There is not much sickness at present.  
The Chinese have mounted the  
country near here yesterday from the  
Grand Canal, the object probably be-  
ing for the defence of the city from  
the north. Does no injury to us. Our  
general health is good."  
More French cruisers to be.  
Paris, July 5.—The Minister of  
Marine, M. de Lanessan, has ordered  
two more cruisers to be fitted out for  
service in Chinese waters.  
Montreal, July 5.—The big Lon-  
don dailies are already sending cor-  
respondents to China. Yesterday's  
Imperial limited took Mr. George  
Lynch of The Daily Express who was  
with Sir George White at Ladysmith.  
Being soon here Mr. Lynch said that  
in the event of war being declared  
there was a strong probability of  
troops being sent via Canada. Mr.  
"Imperial" limited.  
Ottawa, July 5.—Correspondent  
Lynch of The London Express and an  
Imperial officer went west yesterday  
en route for China. The Imperial  
military officer has been sent out to  
report upon the Canadian route as to  
the advisability of sending troops  
over it.

**CAME IN CLOSE RANGE.**  
Boers Gave Strathcona's Horse a Chance  
at Them—On the 1st.  
London, July 5.—Strathcona's  
Horse, with Gen. Clery's force, was  
engaged for the first time on July 1,  
in the neighborhood of Standerton.  
They lost one killed and one officer  
missing. The Boers, probably mis-  
taking them, rode to within 50 yards  
of them, enabling a subaltern to ef-  
fectively use his revolver.  
Dr. Ryan calls.  
Ottawa, July 5.—Hon. Dr. Bor-  
den received a cable stating that Dr.  
Sterling Ryerson, who represented  
the Red Cross, sailed yesterday from  
South Africa on his return to Can-  
ada.  
Gratuitous for Colonial Soldiers.  
Ottawa, July 5.—A militia order  
issued yesterday says:  
"The colonial contingents from Australia  
and Canada, and of the Imperial irregu-  
lar corps raised in South Africa for the  
present war, and in receipt of the ordi-  
nary army rate of pay, will be entitled  
to a gratuity of 10s when discharged medi-  
cally unfit, or on account of their services  
being no longer required in connection  
with the war, or at the termination of  
their engagement. If a non-commissioned  
officer lost his rank while serving, the  
gratuity will be credited to his estate.  
This gratuity will be in addition to the  
gratuity (if any) given to the troops at  
the end of the war."

**BROKE OUT OF COOMASSIE.**  
Sir Frederick H. Hodgson and His Garri-  
son Cut Their Way Through the  
Boer Lines.  
London, July 5.—A telegram has  
been received at the Colonial Office  
from Col. Willocks, dated Fumasi,  
July 3, saying native messengers from  
Paki, who have arrived at Bulwer,  
announce that the Governor of Ash-  
ante, Sir Frederick Mitchell Hodg-  
son, with several officers and their  
wives and families, have left Coomassie  
and arrived at Ekwanwa, twenty  
miles southeast of Coomassie, and  
was proceeding through Denkyera on  
his way to Cape Coast. The messen-  
gers added that many were killed in  
breaking out of Coomassie.  
The rumor appears to be well  
founded, although Col. Willocks fails  
to understand why he has not received  
news from the Governor. The Col-  
onel intends to proceed to Coomassie  
and retake the place if it is evacuated.
