No Suffrage, Says Gibbons. WOMAN'S PROPER PLACE THE HOME CIRCLE, NOT THE POLITICAL ARENA.

Baltimore Oct. 7.—Cardinal Gibbons in his sermon at the Cathedral to-day took strong ground against woman suffrage as having a tendency to lessen woman's influence for good in the home circle, which he regarded as her proper sphere.

The subject of his sermon was the glory of womanhood and the duties of Christian women. He took as his text the blessing pronounced by the angel upon the Virgin Mary. He said:

"Every one of you has a lesson to perfect in your day and generation. You can be very apostolic, preaching in your respective households. It is true you cannot celebrate mass, and yet you can be priests in another and a broader sense. You are a holy, a national, a royal priestess, whose spouse consecrated to God in your baptism.

"It is true you do not need to-day exercise the right of suffrage. She cannot vote and I am heartily glad of it.

"I hope the day will never come when she can vote, and if the right of suffrage is granted to her I hope she will reject it, even though there are some misguided women who think they want it.

"I fear assured that if woman enters politics she will be sure to carry away some of the mud and dirt of political content. She will also lose some of the influence which is now hers.

"The proper sphere of woman is home; the proper place for her to reign is in the home circle.

"A ruler of Greece said: 'I command Athens, Athens rules the world and my wife controls me; therefore, she rules the world.'

"So, nowadays, you men control the United States, and you men control your rule this country. If every Christian mother, daughter and sister looked after religion in the home there would be less need of religious instruction in the schools. The mother is the living oracle to her child.

In after years the words spoken by our mothers through life exercise over us a blessed influence."

And therefore under the protection of Almighty God, and with a single eye to his glory, I have this day set apart as a minister of the Gospel, by the imposition of hands and prayer being assisted by other ordained ministers of the Gospel, James O'Kelly, D.D., and a Brother of the Society of Friends, John C. Lathrop, a man of good character and well qualified for that office.

I do hereby testify that I have received from the Society of Friends a full and complete power to preach the Gospel, and to administer the Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper, according to the usage of the said Church; and whereas there does not appear to me any other way of supplying them with ministers:

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
