

One son Dan was in an engineering unit and was one of those who wired Messines Ridge before it was blown up. One son, Angus, like many others, was reported missing. Others returned, some of them wounded.

SPLENDID RECORD.

Archie MacDonald, the victim of the recent railway crossing fatality at Glace Bay, had an unusual war record. He was one of the six tunnelers who won the world's record for tunnelling in a competition in Belgium during the world war, against English, Australian and Canadian tunnelers. He was in all the big tunnelling work at Messines Ridge for which the Canadian Tunnelers were complimented by the King. Deceased enlisted at Glace Bay with Lieut. George B. Morley, trained at Fombrook, Ont., and served until Armistice Day, already published, he was one of the originals of No. 1 Tunnelling Company. This was the original tunnelling company of the Canadian Expeditionary Forces in the war.—(Sydney Record.)

The social gathering held in St. James' church schoolroom last Wednesday evening, under the auspices of the Organized Bible Class, was a splendid success. About sixty people were in attendance and a varied programme was rendered which gave pleasure to all. Refreshments were served after the programme.

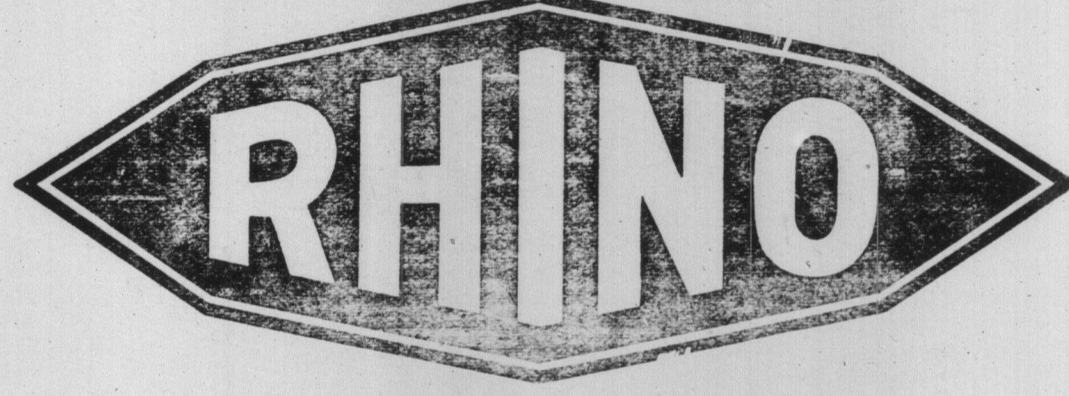

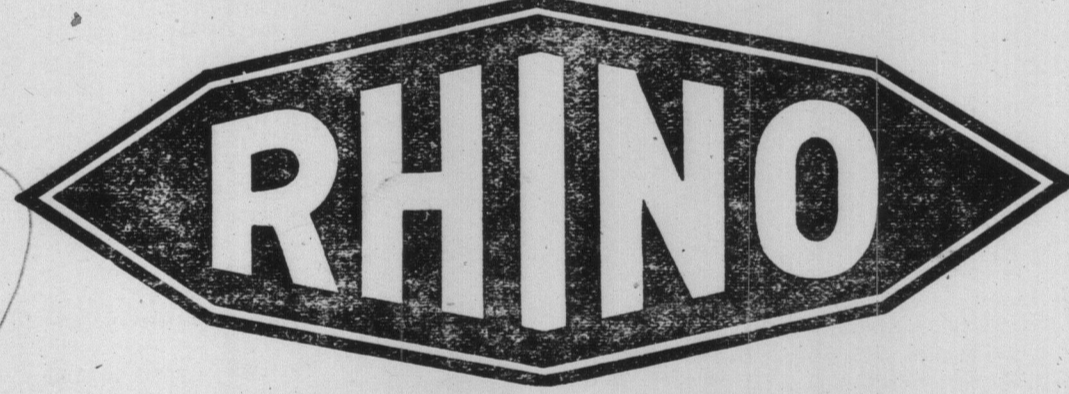

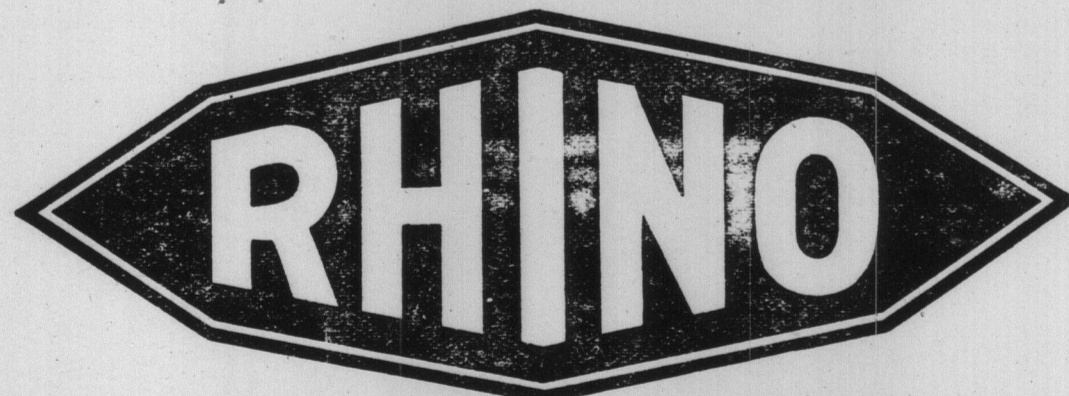
