\$150.00 is added for pew rents, is not sufficient to meet the ordinary current expenses of the Church. The Wardens of St. James' Church, Kentville, urge the congregation, especially those who have not joined the envelope system, (or, pledged weekly offertory) to take the matter into their most serious consideration.

## CHRISTMAS DAY.
