EVANGELICAL MOVEMENT IN GERMANY. Conference at Wittenberg, September 1848. From Correspondence of "Evangelical Christendom." A deep sense of the difficulties and dangers to which the Evangelical Church has long been exposed by the open infidelity of some, and the latitudinarianism of others, of her teachers, but most of all by that pseudo charity, which not only "beareth all things," but smiles alike on all things,--and the overwhelming conviction, that longer to keep silence in regard to such practices was to bid them God speed, were the impelling motives, which originated the "invitation to a free brotherly conference, at Wittenberg on the present condition and future prospects of the Evangelical Church."

THE ELECTRIC LIGHT.--In a lecture which was delivered at Crosby-hall, by Mr. Pepper on the properties and phenomena of magnetism and electricity, the electric light, and the apparatus by which it is produced and regulated, was introduced.
