Appendix B History of the Passport Office

These changes cause a temporary collapse

in passport service as Canadians apply in massive numbers for new passports.



1968: Cabinet confirms a decision to open branch passport offices in cities where major air terminals are located for scheduled overseas flights beginning with Vancouver, Montréal and Toronto.

1969: The following changes in passport requirements become effective April 1st:

- all applicants must support their claim to Canadian citizenship by documentary evidence;
- passports are no longer renewable, and validity is limited to five years;
- · passport services are to be decentralized;
- the Passport Office is made self-supporting, with operations paid for through fees charged for services rendered; and
- · the passport fee increases from \$5 to \$10.
- 1970: Offices open in Montréal, Toronto and Vancouver.
- 1972: Offices open in Halifax and Edmonton.
- 1973: Office opens in Winnipeg.
- 1974: Satellite office opens in North York.
- 1976: Fee increases from \$10 to \$12.
- 1979: Offices open in Saskatoon, St. John's, Hamilton, Calgary and Québec.
- 1980: Fee increases from \$12 to \$20.
- 1981: Offices open in Windsor, London, Fredericton and Victoria.
- 1982: A toll-free telephone service is implemented.

Fee increases from \$20 to \$21.

Head office moves from Ottawa to Hull.

- 1985: Machine readable passports are introduced in Canada.
- **1986:** Automated writing systems are installed in Atlanta, New York, London and Los Angeles. All Canadian missions issue machine readable format passports.
- **1987:** Offices open in Saint-Laurent and Scarborough.

 Automated writing systems are installed in Rome, Paris and Bonn.
- 1988: Fee increases from \$21 to \$25 effective January 1st.

 Automated writing system is installed in Detroit.

 Ottawa Public Counter becomes an issuing office.

 Offices open in Jonquière, Regina and Thunder Bay.
- 1989: Automated writing systems are installed in San Francisco and Hong Kong.
- 1990: North York satellite office becomes an issuing office.

The Passport Office becomes a Special Operating Agency.

Regional offices are reorganized into three reporting units: Eastern, Ontario and Western Operations.

The Passport Office becomes part of the Consular, Immigration and Passport Affairs Branch.

1991: First Meeting of the Advisory Board is held.

The Secretary of State for External Affairs approves new security enhancement measures.

1992: Fee increases from \$25 to \$35 effective January 1st.

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
