PRESENTATION OF DOCUMENTS BY TRANS-CANADA PIPE LINES BEFORE FEDERAL POWER COMMISSION

On the orders of the day:

Mr. H. A. Olson (Medicine Hat): Mr. Speaker, I wish to address a question to the Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources and ask him whether the request by the Federal Power Commission in the United States for additional information respecting Trans-Canada's application for the Great Lakes Pipe Line has now been satisfied. I think last Friday he said that a few hours time would prove his information was more accurate than that given in the press.

Hon. Jean-Luc Pepin (Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources): Mr. Speaker, I have no reason to believe that the information I had on Friday was not right.

Mr. Olson: As a supplementary question, I would like to ask the minister very directly whether the additional information requested by the commission has been supplied to it by Trans-Canada?

Mr. Pepin: Mr. Speaker, I was informed that when the copies of correspondence are tabled according to the wishes of this house, copies will be made available to the Federal Power Commission.

Mr. T. C. Douglas (Burnaby-Coquitlam): Then may I ask the minister when he intends to file the documents which were called for by the house in the motion that was passed last week?

Mr. Pepin: We are doing the collecting of the documents at this moment, Mr. Speaker.

## WOMEN

STUDY OF STATUS BY ROYAL COMMISSION

On the orders of the day:

Hon. Michael Starr (Ontario): Mr. Speaker, I wish to address a question to the right hon. Prime Minister, and ask if he is prepared to grant the reasonable request made by the delegation from the Committee for the Equality of Women which recently came to Ottawa, seeking the establishment of a royal commission on the status of women, which request has been wholeheartedly supported by the Secretary of State.

I may say that they claim they were not given a proper hearing by the Minister of Labour (Mr. Nicholson) and by the Minister of Justice (Mr. Cardin) and I ask whether the Prime Minister will accede to their request?

Right Hon. L. B. Pearson (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, the Secretary of State is very actively pursuing this matter in the cabinet at the present time.

Mr. Donald MacInnis (Cape Breton South): As a supplementary question; the Secretary of State may be very much in favour of such a royal commission, but is not the Prime Minister fully aware that the Minister of National Defence (Mr. Hellyer) is against it?
