Mr. T. C. Douglas (Nanaimo-Cowichan-The Islands): I should like to address a question to the Prime Minister arising out of the statement made by Mr. Jacob Malik, the Soviet Ambassador to the United Nations, in which he supported the proposal of the French government earlier this month for the calling of the Geneva conference in an endeavour to prevent the spreading of the war in Viet Nam to the neighbouring countries of Laos and Cambodia. Does the Canadian government intend publicly to endorse the proposal of those two governments in the hope that a conference can be called and some solution found to the problem in Southeast Asia?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): I am informed that the Department of External Affairs is trying to ascertain whether this proposal or suggestion constitutes, in fact, a concrete proposal by the Soviet Union. If such is the case, we are prepared to support it as we are prepared to support any initiative which would bring peace to the area.
