REQUEST FOR PROGRAM TO UPGRADE LOCKS

The failure of Lock 7 on the Welland Canal in the City of Thorold in my riding of Welland has caused substantial financial loss to the Seaway and the users of it. Would the Minister consider an early implementation of a program of upgrading the lock system, such as the super lock proposal of 1973, for which land has already been expropriated or, as an alternative, the construction of the twinning of Lock 7 in the City of Thorold and Lock 1 in the City of St. Catharines?

He will surely appreciate the fact that it is important for us to determine the cause of the blow-out problem that we have in the St. Lawrence Seaway, and only then to take the appropriate measures. We are obviously very concerned about the present situation. We want our system to remain as efficient as possible in order that we may continue

to enjoy the high quality of service we have had in the St. Lawrence Seaway for 25 years.
