It does not take an economist or a university professor to see the link between poverty, suffering, and conflict. There are countries that are being pushed so hard to pay back their loans or to fight for the very land that provides their sustenance that they have to literally trade the food they grow for arms so that they can trade the arms for money or use the arms to protect the land to grow their food.

The world is getting smaller because of the information age that we as western nations have led the world into. There is no going back to living as a country in isolation. We cannot ignore what is going on around us. We cannot continue to pretend that what goes on does not affect us. It does. It affects us every time we turn on the radio or the television.

This Government has proven time and time again that it cannot be trusted. It has not once lived up to its pre-election, election, or post-election promises. The Government has been indulging in double-speak; it states one thing and does something directly opposite. The latest opinion polls dropping the Tories to their lowest level since the November, 1988 election are giving the Government a clear message: be open in the information to Canadians. They will not accept the Government's hidden agendas. Be above board, forget the hidden taxes, forget the hidden agendas but, above all, to have the trust of Canadians the Government must learn the golden rule that we all learned in elementary school that honesty is the best policy.

## Excise Tax Act

Ms. Margaret Mitchell (Vancouver East): Mr. Speaker, in commenting on Bill C-20, I want to take us back to the Budget of which Bill C-20 is a very small portion, although it is as bad as other portions in this very unsavoury Conservative Budget. I also want to look beyond the Budget to the pre-election period and the promises the Conservatives made to Canadians, and why they made those promises in the context of the Canada-U.S. trade deal.
