

WHITCHURCH ASKS FOR HYDRO RADIAL

Deputation of North York Farmers Visits Hydro Offices.

A large deputation of farmers from Whitechurch Township and the northern district of North York visited the office of the Provincial Hydro-Electric Commission yesterday to submit a proposal for an extension of the hydro-radial system thru Whitechurch and the northern part

Members of the deputation said the
the use of the hydro-electric radial by
law in Newmarket had been a great dis-
appointment in the northern sections of
the county, but they were determined
that Newmarket should not be a block
to progress. They suggested to Chief
Engineer Gaby that a line be surveyed
from the northern trunk of the hydro-
electric radial to the town of Vandon,
Queensville, via the rail line to
East Gwillimbury. Pegg's Bridge at
Sharon. A northern extension would then
take the line up to Bradford, insist
Barrie and Collingwood.

The majority of the municipality affected were represented, and all were reported to favor the proposal. The dissent, it was claimed that the residents of Lincoln had not yet had fair opportunity to express an opinion.

The proposed line would pass within three miles of Newmarket, thru a prosperous farming community, and it is likely that freight traffic would be heavy enough to make the line pay.

Chief Engineer Gaby, who received the deputation, said that the commission would be glad to make the survey required, and prepare an estimate of the cost of the undertaking.

At present the mail reaches Scarborough Junction from Toronto at 3.20 a.m. and is taken by courier to the post-office at the Junction to be despatched to various

ous puts on the train heading up to Woburn, P.O. at one end, two cars are being carried round the country a distance of 18 miles. There is only one mail train that runs between the two towns, and the district found that they could not meet any better arrangement with the Toronto post-office. The Toronto post-office receives more letters from the district than it sends to Toronto than are included in the regular mail train.

"By despatching the mail bags every day on the Kingston road railroads, it would be possible to give the district a better service. People would then get their letters and newspapers from Toronto a few hours after they were posted.


