NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Ten persons were burned to death in a fire which destroyed the three storey tenement house at 66 North Sixth street, Brookyn, tonight. More bodies are believed to be in the ruins. Two more bodies have been recovred, bringing the total number of

lead up to 12.

The fire started in the lower part of the building and spread rapidly to the upper floors, tucting off means of escape. Nearly all the occupants were as eep when the blaze was discovered, but quick work by the police and firemen enabled them to rescue many. The bodies of six adults and four children were among the first recovered.
