West Toronto Firemen Had Biggest Day Ever

Over 2000 People on the Grounds—Rain Benefits Root Crop—Suburban Grist. NORTH TORONTO, Aug. 27.—(Special.)—The third annual picnic held under the auspices of the North Toronto Firemen's Association, today at the waterworks' lawn, Saturday, was without doubt one of the biggest and best things that ever took place in the town.

Fully 2000 people, old, young and middle-aged, were on the ground, and there was an air of prosperity and good citizenship about the whole thing. The town simply emptied itself down into the park, under the ideal weather and the tip-top music furnished by the Citizens' Band post band there.

Mayor Brown, the town council, practically every representative citizen as well as the ladies were there and the way the good things disappeared was a marvel. The commissary department was in charge of the menu, excellent, and the service unequalled.

In all, there were 21 events in the list of sports, all of which evoked keen contests, and following these Mayor Brown made the presentation of the prizes, prefacing this feature of the occasion by a few happy words and appropriate remarks. He voiced the sentiments of the townspeople in general, when he referred to the excellent service and self-sacrificing efforts of the North Toronto firemen.

Prior to the picnic proper, there was a parade of all the brigades of the town, and down Yonge-street, which evoked a lot of attention. The attire of the men was very tasty, and No. 4 were easily the centre of attraction, their outfits being lavishly bedecked with roses. At the park there were fireworks, the setting of a house, a regatta and a score of attractive features. The event ought to net the boys a nice little sum.
