Toronto Symphony Orchestra Recital
Arthur Friedheim's Appearance

Arthur Friedheim, the world-renowned pianist and interpreter of Liszt, was the attraction Wednesday in Massey Hall at the concert of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra. Friedheim is the most remarkable pianist in appearance that we have seen in Toronto. On the street he might easily be taken for a successful lawyer or merchant. His picturesqueness is to be discovered in his genius and in his performance. Most people know the Second Rhapsody, which he played as an encore with slight, but as Friedheim plays it, it comes a new source of enrapturing and exhilarating beauty. This was an encore to the concerto and he also gave as an encore to a later suite the Twelfth Rhapsody, the exquisite lovely theme of which was presented with extraordinary delicacy and charm. It was the second concerto in A major, which, of course, aroused most musical interest. Liszt was never quite satisfied with the piano, and when he became conductor at Weimar he developed his orchestral ideas. In the concerto the gorgeous color of the instrument is laid over the piano theme like the sunshine over a beautiful landscape. The warmth and tone of the one fills in the outline and mass of the other. Friedheim's assurance and definition of touch and his success in eliciting pure tone from his instrument in piano passages, while with the greatest ease of manner he produces volumes of sound in forte, are notable. He allowed a tremolo note to vibrate into silence at one point last night and the interfering beats could be heard throbbing all over the hall. Then a pp passage with the strings accompanying had all the wayward charm of an Aeolian harp. The cello came in with splendid effect in another passage, and a brilliant double forte section with the full orchestra displayed the ray power of the performer. Of the suite the Chopin Waltz was the least effective. The lovely tones of "Les Cloches de Genesve" and the brilliance of the Tenth Rhapsody well merited the enthusiastic encore. The pianist recalled three times each appearance, and Liszt's centenary was well marked.

The orchestra was at its very best and is evidently doing hard work at rehearsal. The delicacy of tone of the violins became apparent in the opening bars of Beethoven's great Fifth Symphony in C minor. The Andante movement is fairly familiar, but it was a rare treat to hear the whole four movements rendered in such fine style. The wood wind was particularly good and combined with the sensitive violin response, much subtlety of interpretation was evident. The heavier orchestration of the third movement was done full justice to and the double basses acquitted themselves well in their rare opportunity. Nothing could have been better than the quiet passage that follows, and this was developed with splendid success into the over-mastering sensations of the full brass choir and the soaring finale. Elbelius' Valse Triste was beautifully played and had to be repeated. The introduction to the third act of Lohengrin concluded the program, and proved that the brasses have been receiving the conductor's attention.

ACCLAMATION FOR M'PHAIL
KINGSTON, Dec. 11.—(Special)—Prof. Alex. McPhail, Queen's University, has been notified he will not have to contest the riding of Queen's P.E.I. in the general election, January 2. He will be returned by acclamation.

The board of trade will, at the next meeting of the Associated Boards of Trade of Ontario, present a resolution asking that the Intercolonial Railway extend its line from Montreal to Toronto via the St. Lawrence River and Lake Ontario.

NEW REGISTRAR OF DEEDS.
James Tucker has been appointed registrar of deeds for North Wellington. The position was made vacant by the death of John Anderson. The newly appointed registrar was defeated by James McEwing in 1908.

TWO WORKMEN CRASHED THRU FLOOR TO DEATH
Scaffolding Gave Way at Museum Building—Dropped 80 Feet—Inquest on Remains.

Peter Lindores, 28 years, McCaul street, and William Lovegrove, 50 years, 13 Pears-avenue, were working at the scaffolding in the elevator shaft where they were at work collapsed and dropped 80 feet to the ground. Lindores was instantly killed, while the other died of his injuries at the General Hospital an hour later. The accident happened at 10 o'clock yesterday morning.

The men were engaged in putting in the cement roof of the shaft, when the temporary flooring up on which they stood gave way. They fell forty feet to a second temporary flooring, where the debris of the first, and all together, planks and men, crashed thru to the ground.

An inquest will be held.
