FIVE CASES OF DYNAMITE EXPLODE IN BRACEBRIDGE

Nearly Every Window in Town Shattered, But No Loss of Life.

Bracebridge, Ont., June 2.—(Special.)—A tremendous explosion occurred at 8 o'clock this evening, when several buildings were shattered and many windows throughout the town, especially on the main business street, were broken.

Four cases of dynamite in a building at the wharf were ignited by a spark which burst in the grass on the hill leading to the lake all day. The explosion was terrific. It was heard many miles distant.

The dynamite was for blasting on the Government road leading to the wharf.

Fortunately no one was close enough to the explosion to be injured. The stable of Hugh Anderson was wrecked. Among the buildings which suffered considerably from broken windows were the house of Dr. Williams, the Court House and the Dominion Hotel. Nearly every place of business on Main-street was similarly damaged.

At this moment it was impossible to compute the monetary loss, but the number of plate glass fronts that will have to be restored is large.

Methodist Ministers in Conference at Falls Relieve Other Pastors.

Niagara Falls, Ont., June 2.—(Special.)—Delegates to the Hamilton conference filled the pulpits in Methodist, Presbyterian and Baptist Churches of this city and preached in the city hall and Union Sunday school hall, also in the First Presbyterian and St. Paul's and St. James' Methodist Churches over the river.

The conference love feast in Morrison-street Methodist Church at 9:30 a.m. was conducted by Rev. John W. Wainwright, D.D. The ordination service was by Bishop Vincent of the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States and was full of sound evangelism. The service of ordaining the four pastors was conducted by President Elliott.

At a crowded Sunday school session in the afternoon able addresses were delivered by Rev. George K. Bradshaw, B.A., and E. A. Brown, and Mr. Hillard. The latter, retired president of the conference, delivered the address, the sacrament of the Lord's supper was administered. President Elliott conducted the service.

In the city hall, at 4 o'clock, a large temperance meeting was held. President Elliott introduced Thomas Hillard of Waterloo, and Joseph Gibson of Ingersoll, both of whom spoke strongly in advocacy of the prohibition of the liquor traffic.

Mr. Hillard contended that alcohol was not a food or a fuel, a necessity, as medicine or a solvent for any one of the three. He found that those who cried for education against the evils of the liquor traffic were not doing anything in that line. Mr. Gibson contended that the responsibility for the liquor traffic rested on the voting population and expressed a hope for woman suffrage. He declared that the United Methodist Church was in a position to help it would receive from others could settle the question out of hand in spite of fears expressed.

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Both political parties had adopted protection of commodities. The liquor traffic was a matter of public importance and the privy council had declared the Manitoba act to abolish the bar to be sound, under the British North America act, and other provinces had the same right without the proposition for compensation.

While there are no doubt many who regret that this diversion was ever commenced, it is impossible entirely to ignore the development which has occurred, without injustice to those who have undertaken it. At the same time it is the opinion of this committee that these rights should be construed with strictness; that no permits should be issued which would permit the diversion of water, either for that now in use or which may hereafter be used, except with the consent of the government. The final settlement of the question of the amount of water which may be taken from Niagara River must necessarily be international in its nature and the result of diplomatic negotiations to be embodied in a treaty. It is, however, very desirable, if not essential, that legislation be now enacted to prevent the further depletion or diversion of water of the river and to furnish a basis for diplomatic action.

Large Powers for Secretary.

All permits to be granted under the
bill are by section 5 revocable within
three years by the secretary of war,
and shall, in any event, terminate at
the expiration of three years from and
after the date of the passage of this
act, the time limited for its operation.

A report has been filed by the joint
