# CROWN CLOSES ITS CASE

Greer Tells of the Discovery- His Visits to Spain and Italy More Witness From Walkerville Says Perkins Hinted at Suicide.

CAYUGA, April 20.-(Special.)-The intention of the defence to heap discredit upon the crown officers who prepared the case was apparent in the

Detective Greer denied having seen the statements since the preliminary investigation, but he had had them in his possession until a month ago. He knew that Mr. Johnston had phoned Mr. Cartwright, the deputy attorneygeneral, in regard to these papers with-out success. He said he had not seen Tem McDonald since the preliminary

County Crown Attorney Murphy was called and gave his version of finding the box and book. He said he sent the box by Chief Constable Farrell to the county treasurer, who kept them in the vault until a few days ago, when Mr. Arnoldi came, and he got it from the treasurer and gave it to Mr. Arnoldi.
