RHODES AND BEIT WILL PAY.

It is Said the Two Millionaires Will Cash Up the Whole Indemnity for the Jameson Raid.

London, Aug. 4.—The Morning Post understands that Cecil Rhodes and Alfred Beit, a former member of the board of directors of the British South Africa Company, have paid the Transvaal Government a quarter of a million pounds sterling as indemnity for the Jameson raid. It has been believed for several months that Messrs. Rhodes and Beit would meet between them the entire cost of the raid, the legal expenses of Dr. Jameson's trial and the indemnity to the Transvaal. As Mr. Rhodes' profits for the year ending last May are known to have been about £500,000 (\$2,500,000), and as Mr. Beit had also one of his best years, neither of them is likely to be ruined if the report stated in The Morning Post is correct.

FIGHTING IN GREECE.

Armed Villagers Defeat Turkish Troops and Seventy of the Latter Were Killed.

Athens, Aug. 3.—A sharp engagement took place between 2000 Turkish troops and the armed population of the villages lying between Metsovo, Trikala and Kalaryates. The Turks retreated after losing 70 killed.

A TREATY WITH CANADA.

Belgian Government Will Endeavor to Do Business on Her Own Account.

Brussels, Aug. 3.—It is reported that the Government will endeavor to arrange a commercial treaty with Canada.

THE TREATY ABRIGATION.

French Papers Express Opinions—England Has Entered on a Great Struggle.

London, Aug. 3.—(Telegram Cable.)—Major Perry of the Canadian Northwest Mounted Police has been attached to the forces now at camp exercise on Salisbury Plain. Referring to the recent denunciation of the commercial treaties with Germany and Belgium, The Gaulois of Paris says that England has been led to this matter less than the intention of benefiting Canada than of attempting to stop the onward march of German trade and commerce.

LOOKS LIKE TROUBLE.

Turkish Warships Have Left the Dardanelles for Cretan Waters.

Constantinople, Aug. 3.—A despatch from the Dardanelles division announces that the second navy division of the Turkish fleet, consisting of seven warships, commanded by Hazi Pasha, has sailed for the Island of Crete. Fears are expressed that the departure of the Turkish division may lead to a collision with the international fleet in Cretan waters. In view of the announcement of the foreign admirals that they have decided to oppose by force the landing of Turkish reinforcements in the Island of Crete.

SURRENDER TO THE BRITISH.

The Rising of Natives in Hebrusland Said to Have Collapsed.

Capetown, Aug. 3.—It is announced that the rising of natives in Hebrusland has collapsed, and that the Government has surrendered to the British authorities.

Secretary Sherman's Letter.

London, Aug. 3.—The Parliamentary Secretary for the Foreign Office, Mr. Curzon, replying in the House of Commons to a question put by Sir Charles W. Dilke, as to whether Her Majesty's Government would at once publish Secretary Sherman's despatch which was mentioned in the reply made to it, but the Government did not think it desirable to publish the two despatches alone, he says they must be published in conjunction with the previous correspondence on the same subject.
