**HE DENOUNCES JINGOISM**

And Blames Americans for the Unpleasant Spirit Shown to England.

Old-Time Prejudices Should be Forgotten in the Assimilation of All Nationalities—English People and Press Have Been Most Patient Under the Attacks of United States Papers—School Books Should be Changed.

Albany, N. Y., Nov. 17.—The Right Rev. William Cresswell Doane, Bishop of Albany, presided at the annual convention of the clergy of the Episcopal Diocese of Albany, which opened here this morning.

In his annual address the Bishop reviewed the proceedings of the meeting of Bishops of the Anglican Communion, held this year in London. He referred to a committee report in favor of international arbitration, saying:

"There can be no question but that within the past few years, from various causes and with some fault on both sides, the minds of men have been accustomed to the idea of a possible resort to arms as the settlement of national questions between England and America. We are responsible for what has been done in America, and which has in it inevitable possibilities of doing harm to other countries. It is our constant political change, untrained thoughtless people in America, that have done this. It is still more unfortunate when statesmen forget the fact that the English people are not jingoistic."

There are two dangers.

"Always in an amalgamated civilization like ours, when we have not yet become one nation, but are a conglomeration of innumerable nationalities only in process of assimilation, there are two dangers. One is the assertion of old-time prejudices and antagonisms, which have no place in our soil and which are the cause of our weakness. The other is the unparliamentary political device of pandering to some of these transient prejudices, in order to secure votes, for one or the other of our politicians."

"I am quite sure that the more thoughtful men in England look with interest and sympathy at the progress of our people, but that they sometimes seem to think, from the unbridled violence of our partisan newspapers, that the English people are not so much as we are in America. I am as sure of the absence of all such feelings among the thoughtful men of England. With these extreme expressions of violence the English Government, the English people, and the English press have been most patient. But, unless we come to recognize more than we do the reckless and unparliamentary character of our own press, we shall be unable to do so.
